Weed Tour Will Be Conducted June 17

A tour of different farms where weed control demonstrations have been made will be conducted Wednesday, June 17, under the auspices of the Willamette grant, with the office of County Agent Fletcher cooperating. It was announced Saturday by Mr. Fletcher.

The tour will start from Truman Chase's farm, just below the Ferry street bridge near the country club grounds, at 1:30 o'clock sharp. At several different places those taking part in the tour will observe results of spraying morning glory and Canada thistles during the past two years and also effects of spraying other weeds only for a year will be noted. At George Morrill's farm the results of special work carried on by Mr. Fletcher with several different kinds of chemicals and under different conditions will be observed.

Everybody interested in this work is invited to take part in the tour, it is announced by Mr. Fletcher.

SAN DIEGO, Cal., June 12.—(AP)—Alexander Pantages, the showman, told his story of his trip to San Diego last October 30 on the witness stand today and in it the hotel party upon which the state based its conspiracy and morals charges against him and three others, was nothing more than a brief intrusion by three women upon a business conference.

The multi-millionaire animated his testimony with expressive gestures, and from time to time left the stand to give an idea of distances or dramatize his story.

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PSYCHOLOGISTS END DISTRICT MEET ON CAMPUS SATURDAY

C. P. Stone, of Stanford university, was named president for the coming year of the Western Psychological association, now in session at the University of Oregon. Other officers named were E. R. Guthrie, University of Washington, vice-president, and Robert H. Seashore, University of Oregon, secretary-treasurer. Stevenson Smith, of Washington, is the retiring head.

The first cross-current between the novelist and the psychologist followed the novel of Dostoevsky, the Russian, in the 1870's and 1890's, said S. Stephenson Smith, of the English department of the University of Oregon. But no really great influence was noticeable until Freud, in the '70's and '80's influenced the work of such authors as Proust and Joyce in sensation as a key to experience. Less fortunate has been the influence of Freud on the novelists, for the popular conception of this psychologist is based on half-truth. Mr. Smith declared, and has profoundly influenced such authors as D. H. Lawrence and Sherwood Anderson, whose novels he believes will in a few years be considered quaint, because their fundamental unsoundness will be very evident.

Joyce and Proust were described as the greatest of the psychological novelists, and the novelists of the future would repay professional psychologists, Mr. Smith believes. Simple symbols are easy to write but less easy to learn than intricate symbols, pointed out J. E. Coover, of Stanford university. This is the reason why the simple systems of shorthand devised in recent years have not been adopted in congress in favor of the old unwieldy but easily learned systems.

The word-association method for lie detection, devised at the University of Oregon, was described by Dr. H. R. Crowland and Lester Beck, who have been working on it for some time. Through this system the suspect is given a list of words, some significant and some not, and his reaction to each is noted. The longer he takes to react, shows that the word is more significant to him.

Other speakers during the morning were Dr. Kate Heyner, University of Minnesota; Sigrid Seashore, Oregon; H. D. Carter, Stanford; Calvin Hall, California; L. Hollingshead, Idaho.

The courts provide a rich field for psychological study, declared Dr. J. E. Dashiell at the afternoon session Friday, of the University of North Carolina, who has made an important initial study of this problem. Though some of the jurists themselves are favorable to the application of psychology to their work, it will not be very long until this science and the law will go hand in hand.

Perfectly normal children may have difficulty in reading, Dr. Francis I. Gaw, of the Seattle public schools, and formerly in industrial education work in England, told the association. She declared tests made in Seattle, and showed that through perfectly normal methods, these normal children were retarded over the difficulties, simply through the medium of individual instruction.

Mr. Yaple was overseas two and one-half years and was one of the picked men used by General Pershing in the demonstration at Paris after the war. The latter part of his service was with the army of occupation in Germany. Funeral services will be held from the Veatch chapel Monday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock. Rev. Harry Benton officiating. Interment will be in the new I. O. O. F. cemetery.

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VETERANS WANT VOICE IN SITE

James H. Baker, commander of the Eugene post of the American Legion, said Saturday night that he would ask for a meeting of the Commanders' Council which represents all veterans' organizations to discuss the location of the Northwest Soldiers' Home as a matter in which veteran organizations should have a hearing.

This movement follows a discussion of the situation in the Eugene post. Tom Russell, who represents the Eugene chamber of commerce in the matter at Washington explained that Eugene had presented a site only after being urged to do so by federal representatives and that the Eugene stand did not mean any hostility to Roseburg.

Russell explained that the home will average between 3,000 and 4,000 residents annually and that 30,000 veterans will pass through it in the course of years, making it important to take the veterans' viewpoint, his recreational needs, his transportation requirements into consideration in the final decision.

The Eugene post voted to ask the Commanders' Council to select a committee representing all veteran organizations to go into the site problem from the ex-soldier angle. No other action was taken. Baker said he hoped to see the new committee appointed within the next week.

A special committee from the board of the United States Veterans' Bureau at Washington is expected to visit Oregon early next month to look over the two sites which have been proposed, one here and the other at Roseburg.

THADDUS GRUBBS DIES FRIDAY P. M.

Thaddus M. Grubbs died at his home on Springfield route 1 Friday evening following an extended illness. He was born in Pennsylvania February 21, 1861, and came to Oregon in 1894, settling with his parents on a donation land grant.
