CAPONE CASES STORY

Hadwick, has appealed a three-year sentence for the same charge. Jack "Greasy Thumb" Guzik, Capone business manager, has appealed a five year sentence, same charge. Sam Guzik, slot machine czar, is serving a year and a day at Leavenworth, same charge.

Al's fair in war, was the government's cry, and any charge was used to break through the wall around Capone. The Mann act was used to haul "Machine Gun Jack" McBurn, expert trigger man, into court. Deportation was the weapon used against Tony "Mops" Volpe, Capone's personal bodyguard. His return journey to Italy awaited only an appeal.

Huge Bribe Refused

Bits of evidence in all these attacks were forced into the case against "Scarface." Every plan of the attack dovetailed.

Johnson has been criticized for delaying contempt charges against Capone. Even here there was method: A decision on the appeal is expected next month Johnson's hope is that the sentence will be sustained and thus his desire to have Capone already in jail during either the liquor law or income tax trials will be realized.

Dozens of government agents have conducted raids, braved death and refused bribes amounting to as high as \$50,000 to carry out Johnson's attack.

As to the liquor violation and income tax trials, Johnson was silent. "An indictment is a liability," the district attorney said. "It becomes an asset only when liquidated with a conviction. I never discuss my cases."

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EUGENE COMPANY C GIVES GUARD MOUNT

CAMP CLATSOP, June 13.—(Special)—Company C of Eugene will be chosen by Colonel H. A. Allen, senior instructor for the Oregon National guard, to present the first formal guard mount ever given in Camp Clatsop for the commanding general.

The Eugene unit was scheduled to go on guard duty Wednesday night. That morning Colonel Allen announced that the company would give a formal guard mount with a picked detail of three squads.

High praise of the formation was given by Brigadier General Thomas A. Hiles, commanding general. Colonel Allen and other officers present. The guard mount was executed in the area in front of brigade officers' quarters.

Captain James A. Meek, company commander, was officer of the day. Adjutant was Lieutenant Oscar Chenoweth of McMinnville. Lieutenant Virgil L. Wood of Company C, was commander of the guard.

Orders were issued following the demonstration by Company C that formal guard mounts would be given in all units going on duty. It is planned to make the formation a regular part of the training.
