

COMMENCEMENT AT UNIVERSITY DRAWS BIG CROWD MONDAY

Western civilization faces ruin. We are organized for the ruin of the race. We fought the world war to make the world safe for democracy," he said, continuing, that less democracy has been seen since the world war than in the days of the republic.

Honest Mind Urged
In discussing the types of students he pointed out that the things inside are far greater than those outside, so long as there is a good honest mind combined with physical well being. The security of the nation and its progress are held to go just as fast as the slowest of us, because, "You carry them all along with you and in the end, gain just as fast as the slowest," he said.

The life of Lincoln was upheld to the students, with his humility of spirit, his common clothes, and the common language he spoke in. The speaker was introduced by Dr. Hall, Rev. Clay E. Palmer gave the invocation for the ceremonies, the national, recessional and other music were played by the University orchestra, directed by Rex Underwood. Burt Brown Barker made the announcement of the gifts to the university for the year.

Sweetener Honored
The degree of doctor of science, an award given only to men of outstanding merit in scientific work, was conferred upon Professor Albert R. Sweetener, for many years professor of botany. Professor Sweetener, who is soon to retire from active teaching, was granted the award because of his contribution to the botany of the Pacific Northwest and his promotion of health measures through the application of science to sanitation.

GRANTS PASS, Ore., June 15.—(AP)—Rain, falling almost continuously since Saturday, continued today to bring relief to the most serious drought condition experienced in the Rogue river basin in many years. The storm was general in this section of the state. Water for irrigation had recently been cut to half on account of the low water mark of the Rogue.

BEND, June 15.—(AP)—Central Oregon awoke refreshed this morning after a gentle rain which, in the two previous nights had totaled .77 of an inch. Great benefit to crops was seen in this section and the range has excellent prospects for the remainder of the season as a result of the rain. Forest fire danger has been virtually eliminated for days to come.

Lowell May Annex Eula District Area

Transfer of a portion of the Eula district to the Lowell district is the object of petitions to be circulated by residents of the area affected, who conferred with the county boundary board Monday.

The section which would be transferred lies on the south side of the Willamette river along the Willamette highway, and attendance of pupils at school on the other side of the river is inconvenient. The Lowell district at present runs a transportation vehicle up the highway far enough to serve this area, it is stated.

One claim in the Landau district would also be affected. The Eula district will have sufficient taxable property to operate its school in spite of the transfer, it was stated.

Wheat Undamaged
While heavy hail storms occurred along the Deschutes river in southern Wasco and Sherman counties, reports here indicate wheat fields escaped exposure in limited areas.

Fruit, gardens and hay tracts along Fifteen-Mile creek in the Dufur section were badly damaged. Twenty miles from Bend, the branch of the Union Pacific was blocked. Crows were busy today clearing debris from the road and the highway. The old Oregon Trail was said to be inundated near Rufus. The Deschutes river rose four feet in 30 minutes after the storm.

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FRATERNITY FACES FORECLOSURE SUIT

Bachelorhood, a University of Oregon fraternity, was made defendant Monday in a foreclosure suit seeking to satisfy claims of \$11,000.50 against the property held by the State Mutual Building and Loan association, the plaintiff in the case.

The fraternity's property is on Alder street between Thirteenth and Fourteenth avenues east, the home of the organization, Mrs. Rose Osburn, who holds a second mortgage of \$6500 against the property, is also made a defendant.

The complaint states that in February, 1928, the fraternity, represented by Carl A. Dobler and Carl E. Rodgers, gave its promissory note for \$13,000 to the D. M. Baker company, mortgaging the property as security. The mortgage and note were later sold to the Mutual company.

There is still due on the note \$11,000.50, and the plaintiff paid \$1683.00 in taxes against the property, the complaint asserts.

Judgment in the latter amount as well as the \$11,000.50 is asked.

Fire on Farm Cause Of Suit for Damage

Suit for \$2500 damages was brought in circuit court Monday by Nick Anderson against the Oregon Bridge and Dredging company, alleging loss by fire through negligence of the defendant.

Anderson claims the defendant company built a fire in connection with roadwork and negligently allowed it to escape to the plaintiff's property, destroying a barn, trees and fences. The roadwork was in the neighborhood of Tiernan, on the upper Siuslaw.

rates represent a general readjustment affecting not only those applying from Willamette valley territory but likewise rates from mills in southern Oregon, northern California and the pine and redwood districts of central California; that it has taken considerably more time to prepare tariffs than originally anticipated.

New tariff of supplies to present tariffs reflecting changes will be available next week. As illustrative of the new adjustment, the following comparison of present and new rates in group D is given as advance information of what the new tariffs will generally reveal:

General minimum weights apply to the new rates, except that rate of 42 to Los Angeles and other points where that figure is shown—will be subject to minimum of 50,000 lbs. per car. Complete details of rates, minimum weights and application will be by understood by those interested through inspection of tariffs.

Also, that all territories will receive the benefit of the materially wider mixtures to be allowed, with a new rule providing that lower and higher rated articles may be shipped in the same car at the carload rate for each, based on the actual weight for the different classes of forest products shipped. This is expected to be of added benefit to the manufacturers.

Bad Weather Delays Salvage

WEIHAUWEL, June 15.—(AP)—Handicapped by continuing bad weather, the U. S. S. Pigeon and other surface vessels today made little progress in the task of salvaging the sunken British submarine Poseidon which was sent to the bottom early this week in collision with a Chinese merchantman. The Pigeon is using her compressed air apparatus to pump water out of the bulk so that she may be raised.

Paul Wallace of Salem, was elected vice president, Merton DeLong of Portland secretary and A. N. Bush of Salem was re-elected treasurer, the only holdover officer.

New trustees elected were Senator James Crawford and B. O. Wright of Portland and C. A. Sprague of Salem.

Donaldson's Bond May Be Cut Down

William Donaldson, held on charges of assault with a deadly weapon, was still in the county jail Monday afternoon, although steps to provide bond for his release were started. James P. Olson, arrested at the same time, provided bail Saturday and was released.

Donaldson is held in lieu of \$2000 bond, and it was understood some effort to have the bond reduced to \$1000 would be made.

Mines Picketed By Families of Miners

ST. CLAIRSVILLE, Ohio, June 15.—(AP)—Four hundred men and women, some with children in their arms, picketed the new Lafferty mine of the M. A. Hanna Coal company today in an effort to cause a total suspension of work. The miners demand an eight hour day and re-employment of men they say were discharged because of union affiliations. Deputy sheriffs kept the crowd moving.

Less than half of the 320 workers reported for work this morning. Striking miners denied any threats had been made.
