

# MYSTERY CLOAKS HEADLESS BODY OF VANCOUVER DANCER

VANCOUVER, Wash., June 16.—Ray Vance met his death by foul play in Multnomah county, in the opinion of Vancouver authorities, and it is up to the Portland officials to investigate the circumstances of his death.

This was the conviction today of Dr. W. E. Cass, Vancouver coroner. He said he could make no further statement until he obtained more evidence concerning the death of the 34-year-old musician and tap dancer.

The Multnomah county angle gave additional credence when M. A. Teewing, reported to Portland authorities that Vance's body may have been tossed over a rail of the Morrison street bridge on the morning of February 27.

Vance was not seen after February 19.

Teewing said he was walking across the bridge when a large automobile stopped at a curb. He said two men got out, bearing a large heavy burden, which might have been a body. He said they dropped it over the rail, jumped in the car and sped away before he could reach them.

Vance's headless body was found in a slough near Ridgefield, Wash., last Friday. It apparently had been in water several weeks and was so decomposed that autopsy was useless. County Prosecutor McMullen said he could do nothing until it developed that a murder was committed in Clark county. Word came from Seattle that Nicholas, friend of Vance, was unable to aid authorities in the investigation of his death. Funeral services for Vance were held here today from St. James' church. Interment was at St. James' acres.

# GAME COMMISSION TALKS PROTECTION

PORTLAND, June 15.—(AP)—Protection of fish life and the question of stream pollution were discussed by the state game commission at its meeting here Monday after it had decided to retain its Portland headquarters and move to Salem.

The commission adopted as a general policy the rule that owners of diversion ditches will be held responsible for screening to keep fish from entering the ditches.

It was agreed, too, to close Fish Lake in Jackson county as soon as the irrigation water is drawn off, in order to preserve the fish that may be left in the stream.

Pollution of the Willamette river by the death of thousands of eels below Oregon City falls was discussed by a delegation from Oregon City. The commission agreed to appropriate \$100 if Oregon City manufacturers would raise \$500 to eradicate the trouble. A suggestion was offered that the eels might be caught and sold for their oil. Fifteen tons of dead eels were burned last year.

# Nesmith Conviction Affirmed By Court

SALEM, June 16.—(AP)—The Oregon supreme court today affirmed the conviction of Lynn Nesmith on a statutory charge, which carried a sentence of seven years in the state penitentiary. The case was removed from Clatsop county. Opinion of Justice Brown affirmed the decree of Judge James T. Brand. The charge was made by a 16 year old girl.

# Woman Dies After Duel With Husband

PORTLAND, June 16.—(AP)—Death came to Beatrice Tunstall, 36, last night, five days after she was wounded in a revolver duel with her former husband, Harry Emery, 55. A charge of first degree murder was today filed against Emery.

The shooting took place on a parking strip on the west side before dawn Thursday. Emery received a shoulder wound from a revolver fired by his wife. Each fired four shots.

# Lumber on Docks Destroyed By Fire

COTTAGE GROVE, Ore., June 16.—(Special)—Between 8,000 and 10,000 feet of lumber on the dock of the W. A. Woodard Lumber company at Latham was destroyed by fire last night.

The blaze was discovered a little after 10 o'clock and had made considerable headway before an alarm was turned in. The fire was extinguished by means of the plant's fire protection system.

The origin of the blaze is not known but incendiaryism is suspected, it was stated.

Mr. Penney will stop at Medford and will take a trip to Crater Lake and other points of interest in that section, according to word received here. He will be accompanied by his staff.

# M'AWENEY GOES TO TRIAL; PAPER GETS BLAST BY ATTORNEY

The trial of F. J. McAweney, charged with attempted larceny in connection with an alleged confidence game, moved forward rapidly Tuesday afternoon after a slow morning session taken up by the selection of a jury.

Sentencing of John Berg, convicted in connection with the case last week, was postponed from 9:30 a. m. Tuesday because the prospective jurors in the McAweney case were in the box and it was thought they might be prejudiced by hearing the Berg sentence. Berg will be sentenced at 1:30 p. m. Wednesday. Defense Attorney Clyde Johnston suggested the postponement.

Considerable anxiety was heard in prosecution circles Tuesday morning when A. V. Carlson, the state's chief witness, failed to show up at the court room. Carlson was subpoenaed to appear Tuesday morning. He later arrived from Portland by stage and was on hand when the state opened its case early Tuesday afternoon.

The Eugene Register-Guard came in for a "drumming" at the hands of Defense Attorney Johnston in connection with questioning of jurors.

When one juror admitted having read the story of the arrest of McAweney and Berg in the paper, Mr. Johnston said:

"As usual, the Register-Guard has tried, convicted, hung, drawn and quartered the defendant before he actually goes to trial."

The defense excused four jurors. O. H. Jones, Lina Haviland, J. H. Fowler and P. L. Rust. The state excused one, Elsie Patton. It was necessary to draw a special panel to fill out the jury box.

The jury finally chosen to hear the case is composed of Lida MacGowan, Dewey McAlpin, Belle V. Stafford, Ella Wallace, Tillie B. Dugan, Kitty Kime, Bart Flanagan, W. H. Sullivan, Marius Anderson, Mamie E. Stauffer, Bryant G. DeBar, and Ellis Guiley.

upon the opportunities of discontent to agitate for adoption of economic patent medicines from foreign lands."

**Proposes American Plan**

Describing the Russian five year plan as a method "through which Russia is struggling to redeem herself from ten years of misery and starvation," Mr. Hoover in answer to those who "insist that we produce an advance plan for the future development of the United States," proposed what he termed "an American plan."

"We plan to take care of 20,000,000 increase in population in the next 20 years. We plan to build for them 1,000,000 new and better homes, thousands of new and still more beautiful city buildings, thousands of factories; to increase capacity of our railroads; to add thousands of miles to our highways and waterways; to install 25,000,000 electrical horsepower."

"We plan to provide new parks, schools, colleges and churches for this 20,000,000 people. We plan to secure greater diffusion of wealth, a decrease in poverty, and a great reduction in crime."

**Give People a Chance**

"And this plan," he declared emphatically, "will be carried out if we keep on giving the American people a chance. Its impulsive force is in the character and spirit of our people. They have already done a better job for 120,000,000 than any other nation in all history."

"The underlying forces of recovery," which he said were asserting themselves he listed as follows: Steadily increasing savings which will not "remain idle long"; higher consumption in many lines of retail goods; good harvest prospects; recovery from the drought; and the dying out of revolutionary movements in other countries.

Pointing to "freedom from strikes, lockouts and disorders unequalled even in prosperous times," he lauded the leaders of industry and labor for their efforts to maintain wages and industrial peace.

**Market Raiders Hit**

With vigor he lashed out at "that minority of people who would make political capital out of the depression through manufacturing our unemployment."

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# 140,000 AFFECTED BY COMPENSATION

SALEM, June 16.—(AP)—More than 140,000 women are affected by the compensation law in Oregon industry, the state industrial accident commission announced today.

The employers in the state about 15,000 are operating under the act. The employer contributes \$5 per cent of the accident fund in the state.

The statement was issued with a plea from women of the commission for a concerted effort on the part of employers and workers to eliminate hazards and to materially reduce the number of accidents. The number averages around 600 every week, and resulting in about three fatalities, the commission reported.

The commission is not considering closing its Portland office and moving to Salem, it announced. It will, however, move its present location, at Tenth and Salmon streets to the Exchange building July 1 where it has secured a five-year lease.

# WARREN G. HARDING MEMORIAL STORY

He debt and taxes and veteran relief organization.

President Hoover, who was secretary of commerce in the Harding cabinet, denounced violations of public trust.

"The breaking down of the faith of a people in the honesty of their government and in the integrity of their institutions, the lowering of respect for the standards of honor which prevail in high places, are crimes for which punishment can never atone," he said.

Concluding, he praised Mr. Harding as "a man of a delicate sense of honor, of sympathetic heart, of transcendent gentleness of soul—who reached out for friendship, who gave it loyally and generously in his every thought and deed."

The text of the president's address follows:

**Symbol of Respect**

"We are assembled here to dedicate the tomb of Warren G. Harding, twenty-ninth president of the United States. This beautiful monument, erected by the voluntary subscriptions of the people, symbolizes their respect for his memory. It has been their response with tender remembrance to a kindly and gentle spirit. As future years come and go each of them will be marked by gatherings here of his friends and the people of a grateful democracy, for democracy has ever paid respect and tribute to those who have given her service."

"Warren G. Harding came from the people. Born just at the close of the Civil war, it became his responsibility to lead the republic in a period of reconstruction from another great war in which our democracy had again demonstrated its unalterable resolve to withstand encroachment upon its independence and to deserve the respect of the world."

"As an aftermath of war our national finances were disorganized, taxes overwhelming, agriculture and business were prostrate, and unemployment widespread. Our country was torn with injustices to those racial groups of our own citizens descended from the enemy nations. Violent bitterness had arisen over the treaty of Versailles."

**Experience Brought**

"These evil spirits aroused by war, augmented by insupportable losses, deep animosities, the dislocations of industry, the vast unemployment in a world still armed and armed, confronted

Those who were his companions on that journey realized full well that he had overstrained even his robust strength in the gigantic task which confronted him during the previous two years. And we came also to know that here was a man whose soul was being seized by a great disillusionment. We saw him gradually weaken not only from physical exhaustion but from mental anxiety. Warren Harding had a dim realization that he had been betrayed by a few of the men whom he had trusted, by men whom he had believed were his devoted friends. It was later proved in the courts of the land that these men had betrayed not alone the friendship and trust of their staunch and loyal friend but they had betrayed their country. That was the tragedy of the life of Warren Harding."

Calvin Coolidge, who succeeded Harding in the presidency, came to this state memorial and joined Herbert Hoover in tribute to the fellowship and understanding of the chief executive and in praise of his efforts for American in the dying post-war period.

"He understood the people," said Mr. Coolidge, "and the people understood him. He had experience and ability, courage and patience, combined with a generous toleration and cheerful optimism that inspired confidence. It seems as though President Harding was pre-eminently fitted to serve the country in the disturbed and distraught period following the war."
