8 CITED FOR DOG LICENSE VIOLATION

A drive on unlicensed dogs was started in earnest Tuesday when H. J. Morris, county dog control officer, cited eight dog owners to appear in court in answer to charges of harboring an unlicensed dog.

Those for whom warrants were issued were C. M. Sheldon, C. C. Rees and George Holiday, Veneta; E. L. Westrope, route one; M. Langle, Coburg; H. R. Lloyd, route two; G. T. Tolman, Coyote creek; and V. H. Davis, Eugene.

Morris said that all persons in the county known to have unlicensed dogs have been notified by slip, and that court action is the only recourse left to the county in enforcing this dog licensing law. He said he expected more citations soon.

World Travel Bill Over Seven Million

WASHINGTON, June 15.—The world travel bill for 1930 was approximately \$7,000,000,000 and two-thirds of this amount, or 50,000,000, was spent by Americans at home and abroad and visitors to this country.

This estimate has been made by the American Automobile association on the basis of a preliminary study of travel figures for the year.

Other figures and facts made public by the association in connection with the world travel were:

1. Close to \$235,000,000 was spent during 1930 by Americans entering Canada in more than 3,000,000 automobiles.

2. The Passion Play at Oberammergau, Germany, and the pilgrimage of Gold Star Mothers to France greatly increased American travel abroad, there being considerably more than 300,000 Americans to make the trip.

Bids for Shingling City Hall Advertised
Bids for reshingling the roof of the city hall are being advertised for and they will be opened at the next meeting of the city council Monday night, June 22. Wooden shingles are specified in the call for bids.

The city has \$1400 in this year's budget for this work and it is expected that the cost of the improvement will come within this amount.

Progress is being made with repairs to the city hall building. The roof has been jacked up and it is now almost in its normal position.

SCHUMANN-HEINK TO GET SUIT IN FULL

LOS ANGELES, June 10.—(U.P.)—Judgment of \$75,000, the full amount asked, was recorded in superior court today in favor of Mme. Ernestine Schumann-Heink in her breach of contract suit against Edwin Carewe, film producer.

Mme. Schumann-Heink claimed Carewe agreed in 1929 to produce a motion picture in which she was to be starred and that she lost a full season of concert engagements through his failure to make the picture.

Ferdinand Schumann-Heink, son of the singer, who claimed he was to have a leading part in the picture, was awarded \$500 of the \$11,000 he sought to recover from Carewe.

Carewe contended that the contract was terminated when an English company failed to supply financial backing.
