

CITY PLAYGROUNDS WILL OPEN MONDAY

Eugene's public playground activities will begin at 1 p. m. next Monday, June 22, and Frank Baker, who had charge of the work last year, will be on hand at the beginning of the work Monday. He was to leave Pasadena Friday by automobile and is expected to arrive Sunday.

Playgrounds will be located this year at several of the grade school buildings and at Riverview park and swimming pool. It is announced. The schools where the activities will be carried on are the Condon, Willard, Lincoln, and Geary.

The hours are given as follows: Monday to Friday, 1 p. m. until dark; Saturday, 11 a. m. to 12 m. and 1 p. m. to 6 p. m.; Sunday, 1 p. m. to dark at Riverview park and pool.

Among the activities of the season will be baseball teams, hand work, basket making, swimming, tennis, swimming lessons, ping pong, jacks, kite-making and kite tournaments, hiking and games of all kinds.

Spray Cherries After Rain, Advice

All cherries that contain the maggots of the fruit fly will be destroyed, said the inspector.
