Obituaries

Daniel Clifford Taylor
 COTTAGE GROVE, June 18.—(Special)—Daniel Clifford Taylor of this city died Friday, June 12, in Portland.

He was born near Cottage Grove, Aug. 10, 1890. He received his early education in the Grove schools, graduating from the high school with high honors. He received his bachelor of arts degree from Willamette university. He was elected to membership in the national social science honor society, Pi Gamma Mu. For two years he taught in the Springfield high school.

When 18 years of age, Mr. Taylor enlisted in the student army training

corps at Oregon State college and was assigned to Company H. The war closed however, before he was sent to more active duty. He was a member of the national guard at Salem, Springfield, and later at Cottage Grove.

Mr. Taylor was teaching at Fort Klamath when stricken a few weeks ago. He went to Portland for an operation but died before the operation could be performed.

Mr. Taylor is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Harvey Taylor, two brothers, Howard and Joe Taylor, and two sisters, Mrs. Esther Sprinkle and Miss Agnes Taylor. He was a member of the Christian church from childhood.

Funeral services were held Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock at the Mills chapel, Rev. Ira R. Aldrich of the Methodist Episcopal church officiating, assisted by Rev. I. G. Shaw of the Christian church. Interment was in the Taylor Lane cemetery, the American Legion conducting the services.
