

FEDERAL SEARCH FOR AL CAPONE'S FOLLOWERS PUSHED

CHICAGO, June 19.—(U.P.)—While federal agents hunted today through the city for 66 followers of Scarface Al Capone, reports were broadcast that Johnnie Torrio had returned and would take over Capone's gang when Scarface Al leaves for Leavenworth prison.

United States District Attorney George E. Q. Johnson, who returned yesterday after receiving President Hoover's personal congratulations for putting Capone out of business, was reported investigating the Torrio stories.

Torrio was considered a "big shot" in the underworld back around 1920, when it is said he personally brought Capone, then a Brooklyn bouncer, to Chicago.

Several attempts were made on Torrio's life and later years and he finally fled. It was said he went to Italy. Reports now are he went to Florida last year and never was out of touch with the gang which became so powerful under Scarface Al's leadership that it earned upwards of \$700,000,000 in ten years.

Most of Capone's chief lieutenants were indicted by the federal government or chased out of the city last week. Capone himself fell a victim last week to the income tax law. Later, another indictment charged Capone and 65 of his followers with 5000 violations of the prohibition laws. Capone pleaded guilty and is awaiting sentence. Two of the 65 have surrendered. Search went on today for the other 63.

The second man to give himself up was Mike Potson, manager of a Chicago cafe. He was released under \$2500 bond. He was charged specifically with owning the property on which federal agents found a big Capone brewery.

Although Johnson and his men had no comment to make on the Torrio report it was said they were investigating with the idea that if Torrio did attempt to succeed Capone they would "get" him in the same way they got Capone.

McAweeney and Berg Start Prison Terms

New residents of the state prison Friday were F. J. McAweeney and John Berg, who were convicted in circuit court here on attempted burglary charges and sentenced to terms of five years each by Circuit Judge G. F. Skipworth.

The hunk men were taken to Salem Friday night by Deputy Sheriff Lee Brown, who headed the investigation which led to their arrest.

Lane Men Aid When Automobile Burns

When Deputy Sheriff Lee Brown, accompanied by Herb Owen, was driving from Salem Thursday night an automobile ahead of them suddenly skidded, turned over twice, and burst into flame.

The Eugene men rushed to the rescue of the four persons in the car, and helped them escape virtually without injury. The car burned up. Those in the machine were G. W.

Time at Hand to Fight Elm Beetle

The time is at hand for spraying for the elm leaf beetle, according to C. E. Stewart, county horticultural inspector.

This pest attacks the leaves of the white elm and the cork bark elm, and is already at work on these trees in Eugene and elsewhere in the county. Control measures should be taken immediately, and Mr. Stewart recommended the use of one pound of lead arsenate to 50 gallons of water as a spray solution.

LIONS CLUB AIDS BRAILLE PROJECT BY GIVING SLATES

Increasing interest in the Red Cross braille project is reported, the latest contribution being from the Eugene Lions club in the shape of eight slates for braille transcription. The slates will be used by the braille writing class which has been organized here under the sponsorship of the Red Cross and is taught by Mrs. G. A. Elmer. There are 11 members of the class, which has already started work.

The University of Oregon is donating the paper for the braille transcriptions, and will bind the completed books. It is hoped to complete five or six books by the time blind students of the university will be ready to use them after the opening of school next fall.

Miss Phyllis Hartzog of the Red Cross office is in charge of the braille writing project. Miss Hartzog states that the members of the class are enthusiastic over the work, and that braille writing has been discovered to be restful and soothing to the nerves.

Equipment for writing for the blind includes the slates, a metal guide, stylus, special paper and slates. The slates are small boards, about the size of a school slate, equipped with a metal guide, and perforations are made in the paper with the stylus through holes in the guide.

Fruit Fly Must Be Controlled in City

Cherry trees inside the corporate limits of the city are subject to the same rigid protective measures against cherry fruit fly as those in rural districts, it was pointed out Friday by C. E. Stewart, county horticultural inspector.

"Infested fruit must be destroyed, wherever it is," said Mr. Stewart. "This fruit fly situation is a serious menace to the cherry industry of this section, and protective measures must be 100 per cent complete."
