Plum Soup. One quart plums, 4 cups water, 1 stick cinnamon, 2 1/2 cup sugar, 1 tablespoon arrowroot, few grains of salt.

Wash plums thoroughly. Put into kettle with water and simmer until skins are broken and fruit is tender.

Strain through jelly bag and add cinnamon and sugar and bring to the boiling point. Add salt and stir in arrowroot mixed to a smooth paste with a little cold water.

Cook until mixture thickens slightly. Chill and serve.

Arrowroot often is used in place of cornstarch and is especially desirable for children, since it is more easily digested.

Salt is always used to take care of the "flat" taste of whatever thickening agent is used.

Cherries and grapes also make delicious fruit soups as well as all the berries.

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TODAY'S RECIPES

By SISTER MARY

ONE of the most refreshing ways to begin a hot weather menu for luncheon or dinner is with a fruit soup. While many housewives have been using this first course for several years, fruit soups are far from common and this novelty adds much to their attraction.

A clear pool of rich color is distinctly pleasing to the eye, and combined with the light fragrance of fruit, tempts doubly.

Tart fruits are best suited to a chilled soup which above all must be pleasant and stimulating. A combination of flavors is also good and affords a variety of effects.

Must Be Cold. Any service which would be correct for either bouillon or a fruit soup can be used for the chilled fruit soup. Bouillon cuts chilling in the ice box before filling, sherbet glasses, glass cups, cocktail glasses or grape fruit sets all are permissible. The soups are eaten with a bouillon or small-bowled soup spoon.

Thorough chilling is essential for half the charm of the soup lies in its temperature.

The thickening agent may be cornstarch, arrowroot, tapioca or even flour. The utmost care must be taken not to make the soup too thick. A firm, sticky concoction is far from inviting but a slightly thick, syrupy consistency is cooling and appetizing.

The following recipes may inspire you to work out some combination for yourself.

Current Soup. One quart red currants, 3 cups water, 3/4 cup sugar, 2 tablespoons minute tapioca, few grains salt.

Stem and wash fruit. Crush and simmer in water for 20 minutes. Strain through a jelly bag and add sugar. Bring to the boiling point and add tapioca and salt. Cook until tapioca is clear and mixture is transparent. Chill and serve.

Two cups of red raspberries and two cups of red currants makes a delicious combination.
