BARTHELMESS TO STAR AT HEILIG

Richard Barthelmess has made much of the greatest role of his career in "The Finger Points" which opens at the Heilig Thursday. He plays the part of a Big Town reporter who in order to get money to spend on the "sob sister" he loves, covers crime in exchange for bribes he extorts from gangsters.

Fay Wray as the "sob sister" of the newspaper who loves the unfortunate youth and keeps his secret to the last, gives a performance of rare beauty. Regis Toomey, as the tiptoeing reporter who also loves the girl, and who, unwittingly, brings down the vengeance of the gang on his friend, does admirable work.

'LAWYER'S SECRET' HAS GREAT CAST
