flight across the Atlantic. They took a turn around the airfield to stretch their legs, had a bite to eat, obtained weather reports and then, fulfilling their description as "young men in a hurry" climbed into their monoplane and set off for Ber-lin.

As they stepped from their ma-chine to be greeted cordially by the British airmen, Post said:

"We had a right good flight. It has been a splendid trip throughout. In truth it has been a real joy trip. The only difficulties we experienced was over a period of three or four hours during the early stages of the flight when we ran into bad weather. The rest of the journey was enjoy-able and the sea was calm. We now are well ahead of our time and are off for Moscow via Berlin."

After Records

Declaring that they were out to break all records for a flight around the world, Post said they were anxious to reach Moscow by tomor-row and no time could be wasted. If their fuel held out, he added, they might not even halt at Berlin which is 700 miles from Chester. The flight from Berlin to Moscow is 925 miles.

Their machine was refueled to capacity while they were here.

The Americans were taken to the royal air force mess where they lunched while their plane was being refueled. They seemed anxious to resume their flight without any delay and after carefully inspecting the machine, the "Winnie Mae," jumped into it, rose into the air and sped southward at terrific speed.

With them went rounds of cheers from the staff of the airfield and townspeople who had flocked there as soon as word of their landing spread.

Lime Bombs Kill Fish in Ohio Town

CHARDON, O.—(UP)—Geauga county (name Warden A. L. Davis is seeking fishermen who use jugs filled with quicklime to bomb fish, dynamite sales being easily traced.

The lime is put in a jug, a quart of water poured on top and a cork driven in. A chemical reaction causes an explosion as soon as the jug is lowered in a hole in the bed of the stream. The fish are either killed or stunned and gathered by the aid of a flashlight, the warden said.

Illiteracy Is Less Among Arizonians

PHOENIX, Ariz.—(UP)—Illiteracy in Arizona has declined from 13.3 per cent to 10.1 per cent in the last ten years, C. O. Case, state superintend-ent of public instruction, has an-nounced.

Arizona's record is remarkable and much better than the figures indicate, Case points out. A majority of those who cannot read or write are Indian wards whose education in under the direction of the federal government.

FLIERS BROADCAST

NEW YORK, June 24.—(AP)—Too tired to talk but believing that the worst was over, Harold Gatty and Wiley Post, American fliers who crossed the Atlantic in 16 hours, broadcast greetings to the United States late today amid the cheers of the crowd which greeted them in Ber-lin. They said they would stay in Ber-lin tonight, continuing their around the world trip in the morning.

Tired, but grinning, the Americans climbed out of their plane, having made the trip from Chester to Berlin in six hours including their brief stop over at HANNOVER.

On landing the machine came to a dead stop and the pilots were unable to get the motor restarted in order to taxi to the hangars where scores of newspaper men, photographers and officials were waiting to welcome them.

Mechanics rushed out to assist them and after ten minutes of vain efforts to restart the motor, they pushed the "Winnie Mae" to the curb-where the official welcome took place.

MRS. GATTY DELIGHTED

LOS ANGELES, June 24.—(AP)—Mrs. Harold Gatty today sat in the living room of the Gattys' modest little Verdugo hills home here today and heard by radio the cheering and shouting following his landing with Wiley Post in Berlin.

"They've landed," she shouted as the cheers from faraway Berlin reached her ears.

She dashed to the door and called her three children, Alan, 5; Ronald, 2; and Lindsay, 3.

"Come and hear your father. He's in Berlin," she explained.

Tears of joy welled in her eyes and she jumped up and down when the announcer said Harold Gatty would have a few words to say. She dashed to the door and cried to the neighbors to come and listen to the landing.

Several times she attempted to tele-phone friends but gave it up, return-ing to the radio.

"We're glad we are here," Gatty's voice said over the air.

"We'll leave tomorrow,"

"That's just like him," said Mrs. Gatty. "He always was bashful, and never would talk, but this grand, though," as she turned to the neighbors who had crowded the small living room.

Weather For Picnic Promises Favorable

Prospects for fair weather at Mc-Credie Springs next Sunday, which is the date of the postponed Masonic picnic here, are good and a large audience is expected.

The special excursion train, planned for last Sunday, will be run this Sun-day, according to S. P. officials, and it is expected that several hundred will take advantage of the low fare offered to visit the springs and at-tend the picnic.

A telephone message from Louis B. Bordie, manager of the springs and who has charge of the arrangements for the picnic at that end, stated that the sun had been shining brightly since Saturday with only a light shower on Sunday.

MILLER SEES FAST TIME ON NEW ROAD

More than 1200 men are engaged in construction work on the "New York-Florence" highway between Florence and the Snake river at the eastern border of Oregon, according to George M. Miller, who has returned to Eugene from a month's scouting trip through the state in the inter-ests of this highway.

"A new highway slogan, running like this, is growing in popularity all along the line: 'Hoise, Burns, Bend to beach from sun to sun,'" said Mr. Miller. "This means we plan to have a highway on which tourists may drive between Boise, Ida., and Flo-rence, Ore., from sunrise to sunset. We now drive between Burns and Bend, 145 miles, in four hours. From Sisters to Florence the right of way is supposed to be 80 feet wide and roadway 48 feet and strong enough to carry military equipment, including cannon, for defense."

Mr. Miller said that the new Mc-Kenzie highway from Waverlyville to Sisters is bound to be extremely popu-lar as it embraces almost one con-tinuous panoramic charm, plus the fragrance of "good" woods.

"One thing more Eugene people should do at once," said Mr. Miller. "This is to build a road from Bel-kan Springs north up the McKenzie to Clear Lake. This is only 21 miles on water grade and will give Lane county an attraction near at home in beauty and natural charm to Crater lake."

States Contribute To Forestry Fund

WASHINGTON.—(UP)—Virtually every state and territory contributed last year to amass almost \$7,000,000 for expenditures on state forestry, fire control, extension and reforesta-tion, the forest service and agricul-ture department here announced re-cently after completing a summary of state and territorial expenditures last year.

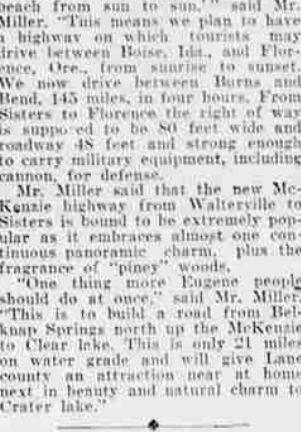
State forest work has shown a total gain of \$4,000,000 in the last two years, forest service officials pointed out, and has been success-ful in extending fire protection and reforestation to several million acres of forest lands. In the past year over \$2,500,000 was spent by the states for fire protection and up-wards of \$1,000,000 for reforestation projects. During the same time \$2,300,000 was spent for additional pur-chases and maintenance.
