

CHAUFFEURS AND DRIVERS EXAMINED UNDER NEW STATUTE

Twelve applicants for drivers' and chauffeurs' licenses had been examined at Eugene police headquarters today, according to Glen Bowen, who has charge of the examinations in this city.

Under the new state law all chauffeurs and all new drivers are compelled to be examined as to their fitness for operating an automobile and those who have had their drivers' licenses for a long time or any time up to the present will not be compelled to undergo an examination now. Some time within three years, however, these licenses will be revoked and new ones issued upon examination.

Mr. Bowen will be at the police office again Saturday from 8 a. m. to 5 p. m. and the schedule after that is as follows: Thursday, July 5, from 1 to 5 p. m.; July 11, from 8 a. m. to 5 p. m.; July 23, from 1 to 5 p. m.; July 24, from 8 a. m. to 5 p. m.; July 25 from 8 a. m. to 5 p. m.

A test as to vision, color, and hearing, whether or not the applicant is able to read road signs, whether or not he is crippled, whether or not he has been convicted of violating the traffic laws, whether or not he has an organic affection of the heart, whether or not he has suffered from epilepsy, paralysis or vertigo, falling spells or dizziness, is given.

In case the applicant fails in his first examination he may try again, the law provides. Chauffeurs' licenses are good for only a year and must be renewed at the end of that period.

Willing and Dolp Assume Big Leads

TACOMA, June 26.—(AP)—Dr. O. P. Willing and Frank Dolp, both of Portland, virtually clinched final places in the Pacific northwest amateur golf tournament here when they scored big leads on the first 18 of their 36 hole semi-final matches today. Willing was 10 up on Alec Duncan, Seattle, and Dolp was four holes ahead of Freddie Wood, Vancouver, B. C.

Mrs. Potter defeated Mrs. B. E. Eva, Portland, tournament medalist, 4 and 2, while Mrs. Hutchings, one hole behind at the 9th, came back to nose out Miss Hilda McAnislin, Seattle, 2 and 1. Women's play in the semi-finals was over 18 holes.

British Radio Has Large Turnover

LONDON.—(AP)—The British radio industry had a turnover of \$100,000,000 in 1930, an increase of 40 per cent over 1929, according to statistics published by the Wireless and Gramophone Trade.

Approximately 3,600,000 of the 11,000,000 homes in Great Britain have radio. Homeless families are estimated at 1,000,000. Radio will eventually be installed in at least 75 per cent of the homes in the country.

Pretty Young Society Matron Is Police Head

Woman, Who Doesn't Know Police Blotter From Ordinary Desk Variety, is Head of Town's Force

LONG BRANCH, N. J., June 26.—Mrs. Cornelia Woolley Hopkins is just a pretty young society woman with a summer home and a lot of friends in Long Branch. She never pretended to know anything about law enforcement.

So when this town woke up the other morning to find that it had a woman police commissioner—and that woman Mrs. Hopkins—officials were considerably wrought up about it.

All the officials, that is, except Commissioner of Public Safety Charles E. Brown, who appointed her without the knowledge of Mayor J. William Jones and the other commissioners, and Police Judge Joseph M. Rosen, who administered the oath. They thought it entirely fitting and proper that a 33-year-old woman, even if she never had been inside a police station, should be the nominal head of the town's uniformed force.

And she certainly has all the social graces of Grover Whalen, who served New York City with such distinction.

What mattered it that Mrs. Hopkins didn't know a police blotter from the ordinary desk variety? Commissioner Brown and Judge Rosen assured the irate officials that the appointment really was an honorary one. Long Branch never has had a police commissioner before. It doesn't need one now. This was just one of the little courtesies that may be shown to valued citizens.

But there were a lot of old men who were quick to raise objections. Solicitor Edwards, called on for expert opinion, declared the appointment was illegal, since Brown had delegated the duties of his own office, an elective one, to Mrs. Hopkins.

"The town commission, most of it, anyway, promised to do something to bring an early end to her rule. Why, there was even a rumor that she intended issuing an order against any sort of censorship of bathing suits on the beach."

J. A. Pauw, a German trained timber engineer, will be obtained to direct the department. Germany has worked out methods of fastening timber in large construction projects and other new wrinkles which have been unknown to American timber erectors and these will be applied to the industry here.

Big Construction Project Started

BUTTE, Mont.—(AP)—The largest construction project since the pioneering of the transcontinental railroads—the piping of natural gas from northern Montana fields to cities and industries of southwestern Montana—is underway.

The first shovel of ground for the \$15,000,000 project was turned last week, and each week until the completion of the huge pipeline and numerous distributing systems will see increased activity.

The Montana Power Company already has franchises to serve more than half a dozen cities, including Butte and Anaconda whose industries will use more than 10,000,000 cubic feet of gas annually.

CHINA'S JOBLESS OFFER PROBLEMS

PEIPING.—(AP)—China's unemployment problem is, perhaps, greater than that of any other country today, according to semi-official statistics in several North China cities.

A survey of Tientsin, the port of Peiping, shows that 400,000 persons are unemployed out of a total population of 1,450,000. Similar figures for Peiping indicate that more than 200,000 are unemployed here in a population of about a million.

Superficial surveys in other North China cities indicate that at east one-fifth of the population is unemployed. The slump in silver exchange, and the world-wide depression, are cited as the principal causes.

Chinese economists estimate that men and women entirely out of work in China today, or those working for less than a living wage, may total 50,000,000, out of a population of 450,000,000. In some provinces they declare it is possible that half the population is without work.

Peiping is better off than most Chinese cities, because 100,000 handicraft workers are kept employed making articles for export. But
