

RED MENACE OF RUSSIA FACING AMERICA TODAY

SPOKANE, Wash., June 27.—(AP)—E. W. Hodges, New York, international president of the Lions service clubs, declared today that the "red menace of Russia is a challenge to the Lions of America."

He spoke before the Pacific north-west convention of the group.

"When some nation of 150 million people, with a government of bayonets, is laying down on our seaboard more than 150 elements of civil life in our country 60 per cent cheaper than we can produce them, isn't it time for worry?" he said. "Isn't it your task?"

"When they meet 30,000 strong, as they did in New York city last May, carrying the red banners of 'down with government' isn't it time to realize the need of strong men to win?"

"What we need now more than any one thing is men of mind and soul, men of common sense, with love of country, loyalty to church and school and God."

Taking a rap at H. L. Mencken, who has ridiculed service clubs and their conventions, Hodges said, "conventions are not debauches. They are workshops of businessmen, in the exchange of ideas on business. If civic clubs do one lasting thing, it is to develop community leadership."

Tom Fowler, Seattle, was elected governor of the northwest district and Vancouver, B. C., chosen for the 1932 convention city. A. B. Lund, Seattle, was re-elected secretary.

CHINESE BANDITS RAVAGE BIG AREA

SHANGHAI, June 27.—(AP)—Chinese bandits today ravaged a big area estimated at 400,000 the number of men, women and children slain by bandits and communists in eastern and central China province in the last five years.

Chinese press reports quoted investigators as saying the affected area centered about the cities of Luoyang and Peking had been reduced to a virtual wasteland by outlaws and that the majority of the survivors had moved elsewhere.

The survey said that in 1924 the population of the Peking area totaled 700,000 while today it was "only a few thousand." It estimated the number slain in that area at 225,000.

In the Luoyang area, the report said, 172,000 were killed. A woeful picture was painted in the details. The document said regions of terror repeatedly swept the various areas whenever bandits or reds gained control. Wholesale killing, looting and destruction of property followed.

Changsha, the capital, itself was sacked and burned last July.

400 CLAIMS FILED BY BANK CREDITORS

SPRINGFIELD, June 27.—(Special)—About 400 claims had been filed with the Commercial State bank, in liquidation, at the close of business Saturday noon. It was reported by bank officials. The bank opened Friday for the filing of claims. About 200 were filed on Saturday.

The bank mailed proof of claim blanks to approximately 800 parties who are creditors of the bank Thursday. Ninety days, or until September 24, are given creditors in which to file their claims. E. G. Havemann, deputy state bank superintendent, is in charge of the liquidation of the bank. The bank will not be able to pay its creditors until all claims are filed, and Mr. Havemann said that this probably would not begin for about four months.

Fireworks Banned In Forest; Smoker Ruling In Effect

Laws which prohibit the use of fireworks in the national forests and regulate smoking were cited Saturday by Foster Steele, assistant supervisor of the Cascade national forest.

People contemplating spending the Fourth of July in the forest were advised against the use of fireworks of any kind. "The present favorable weather conditions may change rapidly before July 4," Mr. Steele said, "and even if they do not change the law is not flexible enough to permit forest officers to disregard its enforcement."

The smokers' code goes into effect July 1. Except on paved or surfaced highways, smoking on lands of the United States in the national forests of Oregon and Washington while traveling in timber, brush or grass is prohibited from that date to the end of the regular fire season.

Persons wishing to smoke must stop in a safe place and finish their smoke and carefully put out the coals or fire before traveling on.

JAN. 1 DEADLINE FOR BAN RULING

WASHINGTON, June 27.—(AP)—Secretary Mellon must rule before Jan. 1 on whether all Russian commerce is the product of forced or indentured labor.

On that date, the provision in the tariff act of 1930 extending the import prohibition against convict-made goods to foreign articles produced by forced or indentured labor becomes effective.

In making this decision, the secretary will receive strong recommendations to place all Russian commerce under the ban. It is contended by some officials in the customs service that Russia has no free labor and the requirement that a man must work to secure a food ticket puts his labor in the forced class.

However, the drafting of treasury regulations to meet the requirement in the tariff act are considered a major matter of administration policy and it is not expected action will be taken without the approval of President Hoover.

TWO FOREST AREAS CLOSED TO ENTRY

Two areas of the Cascade national forest will be closed to entry July 7 and another will be closed to smoking. Foster Steele, assistant supervisor, announced Saturday.

The closure will be made to allow forest officials to protect the areas from the hazard occasioned by the severe windstorm which blew down many trees in the spring. The smoking ban has been placed on an area which is being logged by a lumber company.

The first area comprises the watershed of the south fork of the McKenzie river between the east fork and Dutch oven. Visitors to the forest still have all that territory south and east of Dutch oven, which area can be reached by the Olallie trail from McKenzie Bridge.

The closed area extends east to Olallie trail and includes Walker creek, French Pete, Star Blue, Hardy, Ridge, Rider, Boone, Slide and other creeks in the territory. The closed area extends westward to Portland creek near the Falls, Laird ranch and takes in the territory which forms the watershed of upper Fall creek. This area is closed because of the hazardous Portland creek burn.

The second closed area consists of the area northeast of Oakridge from which timber is being cut by the Western Lumber company. The territory includes Huckleberry, Third, Fourth, Fifth and Sixth creeks and their watersheds. All the area in which the company is carrying on logging operations will be closed to smoking.

These areas are being closed this year at a much later date than is usual because of the favorable weather conditions. They are being closed late enough to allow persons to visit the areas during the Fourth.

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MERGED CHURCHES AGREED ON NAME

SEATTLE, Wash., June 27.—(AP)—The name "Congregational and Christian church" for the two denominations of those names whose union is being consummated in their joint national convention here was approved today by the Congregational commission on interstate relations. Delegates said approval by the Christian (Campbellite) group was considered assured.

Agreement on a joint constitution was also assured, delegates said, while conferences continue in an endeavor to reach union on proposed bylaws. Concurrent adoption of the constitution and bylaws, which delegates said would be "the wedding ceremony for the two churches," was expected to take place Wednesday.

The constitution provides for entering of other denominations in the union which brings together more than 3,000,000 adherents of the two sects. The Christian church involved is the one known as the Campbellites and not the Christian church generally known by that name in the far west.

Issues including birth control and companionate marriage were being discussed in several seminars last today which will recommend rulings which may be included in bylaws.
