

TAX REDUCTIONS FOR STATE PLAN OF JULIUS MEIER

SALEM, June 28.—(AP)—Moving to carry his program of anticipated tax reductions into local and county districts, Governor Julius L. Meier will meet with a statewide committee here July 8. The appointment of the 70 representatives in this group was announced late Saturday by the governor.

In announcing the meeting next week, the executive said it was called with the hope a reduction of our tax levy to the lowest possible minimum will be effected. The functions of the committee he said, were twofold: To make a study of local tax levies and to co-operate with local bodies to eliminate waste and unnecessary expenditure; and to make a study of legislation of other states for control of local budgets and tax levies, and to formulate similar legislation for Oregon.

"Including state, county, municipal, school district, road district and port taxes, our annual tax levy approximates \$50,000,000. Of this sum, less than \$7,000,000 is expended for strictly state purposes, the balance representing local expenditures," the governor said.

"It is apparent at a glance that if any appreciable reduction in tax levies is to be made in Oregon, a rigid retrenchment program must be inaugurated in each and every one of our local tax levying subdivisions."

"It is for the purpose of devising ways and means to launch a program which will accomplish this end, and for the formulation of legislation that will, in the future, control local expenditures in the state of Oregon that a meeting of the committee has been called."

BOYS SETTLE DOWN AT Y. M. C. A. CAMP

The annual Eugene Y. M. C. A. boys' camp on Brice creek 30 miles above Cottage Grove, Oregon, was in session today. The camp, which runs for four weeks, being held in two periods of two weeks each.

Thirty of the 84 boys who had signed for the first period made the trip to camp Sunday morning and by the middle of the afternoon all were comfortably housed in tents with wooden flooring. There are four and five boys to the tent, each group having an older boy as tent master to look after the welfare and comfort of the younger ones.

The first meal in camp was dinner at 1:30 Sunday afternoon, served a little late on account of the confusion incident to making camp, but hereafter it is given on time and everything will be carried out in regular and systematic routine.

Fishing in the creek is fine. It was reported. One small boy caught about a dozen trout since his arrival at camp and others caught several each.

The stream is very beautiful, with numerous falls and rapids all the way from the camp to its confluence with Row river. The road from the bridge where it turns in a fair shape and will be much better with the advent of warmer weather. The rains have made it muddy in places but it is passable everywhere.

Bill Kinsell, boys' work secretary at the Y. M. C. A., will be with the boys throughout both periods of camp and he has a number of assistants.

SQUIRREL POISON WORK TO BE CLOSED

Up to Monday eight rodent control supervisors in different parts of Lane county had turned in claims for poisoned gray digger squirrels on neglected tracts, amounting to \$85, according to O. S. Fletcher, county agent. Mr. Fletcher is making an effort to close up the work as soon as possible and not later than next Monday. While the squirrels can be poisoned at any time during the summer, the best time is in the spring when they are first coming out and before the young ones are born. Mr. Fletcher is sending out a letter to all of the supervisors, urging them to submit their claims for poisoning on neglected land by July 6.

In his letter Mr. Fletcher says: "Squirrels will eat the poisoned barley at any time and if any of you have neighbors who have not completed their poisoning, you should urge them to do so at once. I have reports of many instances where farmers have poisoned squirrels around shocks of grain successfully. These instances show that it is practical to poison squirrels as late as the harvest season, even if it is not the best practice to wait that long."

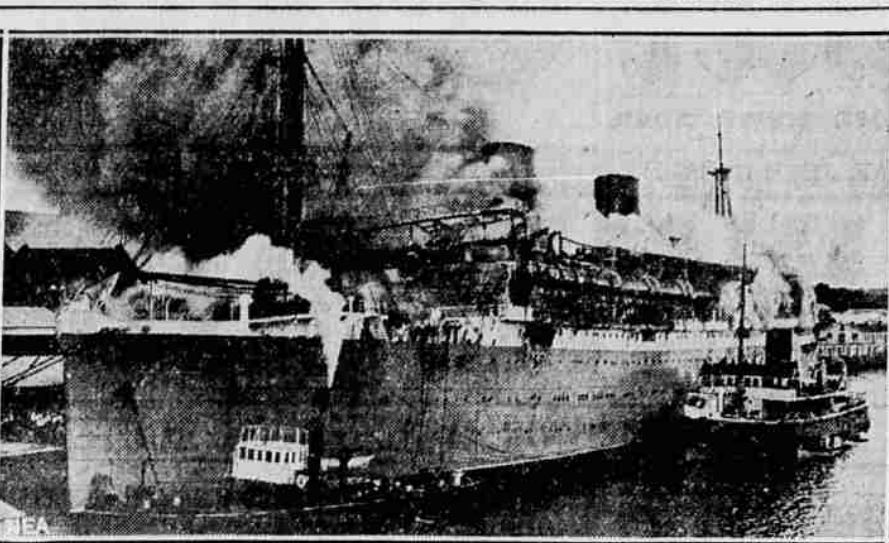
George Bishop, accompanied by John Stark Evans, sang and a trio composed of Misses Erelle Johnson, Irma Gross, and Maxine Moore, played.

WHEN BIG LINER BURNED AND SANK AT DOCK!



The \$7,000,000 liner Bermuda was going up in smoke when the above picture was taken at the Hamilton, Bermuda, docks the other day. Lifting badly, and with fuel tanks flooded to prevent an explosion that would have imperiled hundreds, the craft soon settled to the bottom. British naval forces, as well as all fire-fighting apparatus of the city, were unable to prevent destruction of the Bermuda's superstructure and extensive damage to three lower decks. Only one life was lost, but several members of her crew were severely injured. Pictured below is the rescue of some of the wounded men from the smoke and flame-swept vessel. All of the passengers, who were due to sail for New York, escaped. British marines and sailors with fixed bayonets kept crowds far from the docks because of the threat of an explosion.

Swallows Build In Paper Box; 4 Youngsters Born

Slayer of Nurse Seeks New Trial

PROVIDENCE, R. I., June 28.—(AP)—Elliott R. "Pinkie" Hathaway, 28, facing a mandatory life sentence after conviction of a charge of the murder of Verna E. Russell, 20, pretty student nurse, hoped today to win a new trial.

A Newport county grand jury which deliberated only one hour and 40 minutes and took only one ballot found him guilty, Saturday.

Imposition of the life sentence doubtless will be long delayed by the new trial fight contemplated by defense counsel. Meanwhile the Massachusetts legislator's son will remain in the Providence county jail in Cranston where he has been confined since he surrendered two days after Verna's body was found, except for the three weeks that he was on trial in Newport.

Alfalfa Is Still Being Planted Here

Calls for alfalfa seed culture are still being received at the office of O. S. Fletcher, county agent, and this crop may yet be planted this summer, he said. More than 300 acres of the crop have been planted during the past two weeks in Lane county and a number of farmers are planning to plant it this week as evidenced from the calls for the seed culture received at the agent's office.

As long as the land is cultivated sufficiently to hold the moisture the seed can be planted, it was stated. He said it was not advisable to sow the seed on ground a hay crop had already been harvested this year.

Stribling's record reveals that he has always muffed his big chance in the past, and his training activities do not reveal him as an improved fighter. He was awkward, inaccurate and indifferent in a four-round workout last night against Frank Cawley, Pittston, Pa., Frank Kitts, Akron, O., and Gene Stanton, Cleveland, at his Geauga Lake, O., training camp.

One of the best answers to why nearly everyone favors Stribling to win is because Schmeling has made himself decidedly unpopular by his high and mighty attitude since winning recognition as champion by winning on a foul from Jack Sharkey.

PASSION PLAY TO CLOSE HERE MONDAY

Eugene and Lane county people will be given their last opportunity to see the Freiburg Passion Play, mammoth religious performance goes the Monday evening performance goes on at 8:15 o'clock. The pageant which is being presented on a stage in McArthur court, features the original German company of 40 players assisted by an orchestra of 25 pieces trained by Buford Roach, a chorus of 150 voices organized by John Stark Evans, and a mob of more than 300 Eugene "extras."

The great spectacle was presented before a large audience Sunday evening, and everyone who has seen it during the past three days acclaims it as one of the most beautiful and inspiring pageants ever brought to the Willamette valley. Ministers, laymen, businessmen and people of all classes join in praise of the marvelous Passion Play which had its origin in the Black Forest of Germany more than 700 years ago.

Adolf Passnacht, world's greatest Christus portrayer, has been applauded for his interpretation of Jesus, the Man of Sorrows, and the astounding lighting effects and beautiful settings, together with the perfectly trained musical organizations, have contrived to make the Eugene presentation a thing of rare beauty.

The Sunday evening crowd was as big as the first two nights put together and the Eugene American Legion, which is sponsoring the event, anticipates an even bigger turnout Monday for the final presentation.

Further work on "The Story of Daddy Long Legs" will be taken up later.

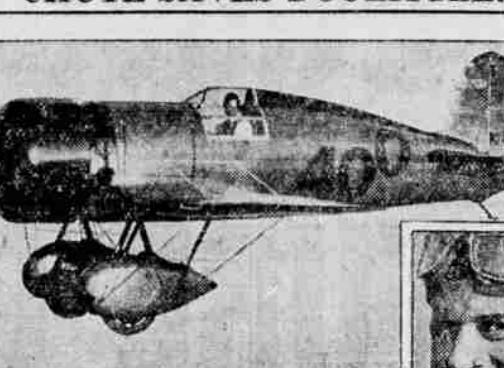
Anthropologist to Speak for Rotary

The former ace stunt flyer of the army was roaring along at 235 miles per hour in his new plane, as shown above, at an altitude of 10 feet over the East St. Louis, Ill., airport when fabric tore loose from the wings. He nosed the ship up sharply to 300 feet, rolled it over onto its back and "bailed out," landing safely while the speedy new plane, in which he hoped to set new records, crashed. Wreckage of the ship is shown below surrounded by spectators. Doolittle saved his life once before by leaping, when the wings came off an army plane he was stunting at the national air races in Cleveland in 1929.
