## Local Folk Will Be On Church Program

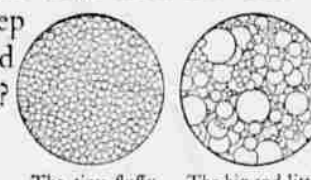
Several Eugeneans are on the program for the seventy-ninth annual convention of Christian churches to open Wednesday at Turner to continue through until Sunday.
