Grove W. R. C. Has Meeting Saturday

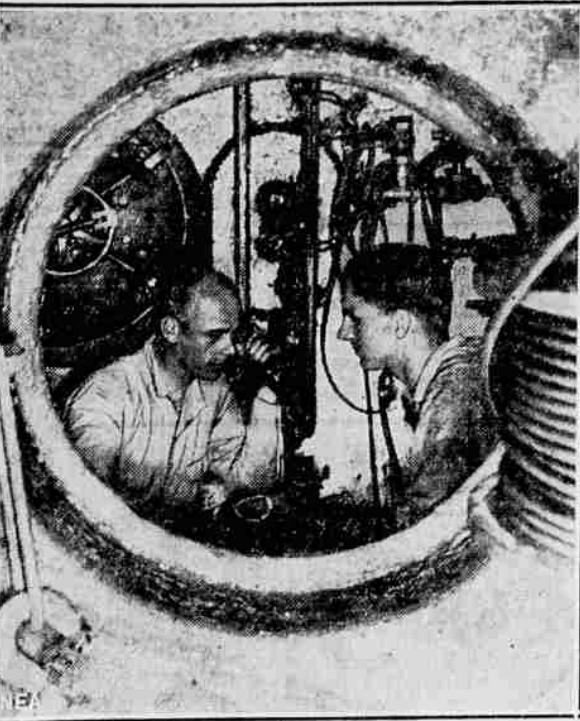

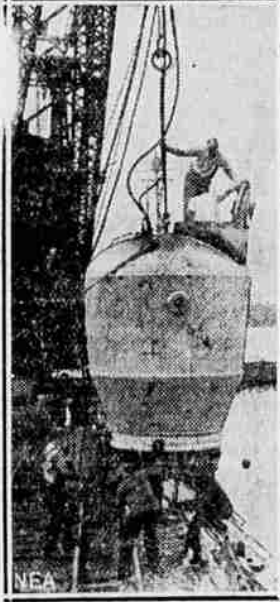

Here's a glimpse into the newest development of the U. S. Navy for the rescue of the crews of disabled submarines. Lieutenants A. R. McCann, left, above, and A. M. Morgan are shown inside a steel buoy which can be detached from a submarine and sent to the surface to send out radio signals, mark the location of the sunken craft, and communicate with it by telephone. All American submarines probably will be equipped with the device, which was tested successfully at the Brooklyn Navy Yard recently.
