SPECULATION AND WEATHER SEEN AS DEPRESSION CAUSE

SALEM, Ore., June 29.—(U.P.)—Floods, droughts and manipulation of the stock market and not the tariff are at the bottom of the present business depression in this country, Congressman Willis C. Hawley told the Salem chamber of commerce today. Floods in the middle west and droughts in various sections of the country during the past year, Hawley pointed out, seriously impaired the buying power of the American farmer. This in turn reduced the demand for commodities produced by American industry with the result that production was reduced and millions of men thrown out of employment.

Hawley, however, expressed the conviction that the present depression was only temporary. In fact, that the pendulum had already started to swing back and that business was already on the up-grade.

Coupled with floods and droughts, Hawley blamed the manipulators of the stock market for the depression. The crash of the market last fall, he declared, robbed the investing public of its confidence and instead of putting its capital into circulation it was hoarding its money in banks or investing it in government securities. Referring to the tariff which has been ascribed as the cause of the depression, Hawley declared that the "United States has been more generous in its treatment of imports than have any of the European nations."

For four years preceding the last upward revision of the American tariff, he declared, 34 foreign nations made upward revisions of their tariffs in an effort to protect capital and labor.

"The American system had nothing to do with our business depression," Hawley said. "Business conditions in this country are sound. We have the capital, we have the skilled labor. We have abundant resources. Fifteen times before this the United States experienced similar depressions and each time it rose to still greater heights of prosperity."

"It is only necessary that the people of the country shall again take their courage in hand to start the restoration of business to normalcy and upon our resuscitation rests the hope of the remainder of the world."

Will Hays Accused Of Bribery Of Churchmen

BRIDGEPORT, Conn., June 29.—(U.P.)—The Bridgeport Telegram, in a copyrighted interview with the Rev. George Fred Andrews, today quoted the minister as charging Will Hays with spending money widely to prevent attacks on the motion picture industry by the Federal Council of Churches, and saying the council had once prevented the production of a picture which "would have scandalized the Christian world."

Rev. Mr. Andrews was formerly chairman of the church and drama association of the council. In his interview he charged Hays with undertaking to "buy me by generous offers of secret money, and intending through me to control the organizations with which I was connected and manipulate his efforts to prevent effective late them to his own advantage in criticism of the movies." He further expressed indignation that his colleagues in the association had "succumbed to the lure of movie money," and declared he was forced to resign through "political pressure."

Hays, Mr. Andrews said, contemplated a religious picture which would have proved distasteful to the entire Christian world, injecting a love interest, but was prevented by the minister's efforts.

Relative to the picture "King of Kings," Mr. Andrews declared Hays had agreed to carry out the production in cooperation with himself and other members of the church and drama association as a piece of religious education, and turn over ten per cent of the returns to the minister to carry on religious education through the production of similar pictures. In his agreement, according to the Telegram, Andrews asked that the money come to him personally, to insure its use for that purpose, in the event that, through political pressure he be forced to resign. He did resign somewhat later.

He said he expects the investigation of the federal council to result in Hays' resignation.

AUTO, HORSEBACK RIDING ACCIDENTS TAKE DEATH TOLL

PORTLAND, Ore., June 29.—(U.P.)—Automobile and horseback riding accidents killed one man, gravely injured two and caused less serious injury to a number of other persons in and near Portland yesterday.

The dead: Captain Frederick C. Hagemann, 52, ship chandler, automobile collision victim.

Most seriously injured: Robert C. Calder, 27, possibly punctured lungs suffered when struck by a horse's hoof.

Mel Sickafosse, 29, cerebral concussion, suffered in fall from horse. Julius Zell, 35, dislocated shoulder and leg and rib fractures, suffered in fall from horse.

Hagemann died a few hours after an automobile collision on Linton road near the St. John's bridge. Seven others were injured in the wreck.

Ralph Hinkle, 23, asserted driver of one of the machines was arrested on a charge of driving while drunk. Police said the charge would probably be changed to involuntary manslaughter.

Calder and Sickafosse were hurt in the steepchase with which Portland Hunt club closed its spring meet today. The former was ridden down when he attempted to rise after his fall. A hoof struck his chest. Oxygen was administered to assist his breathing last night.

Sickafosse was badly hurt, attendants said, but was expected to recover.

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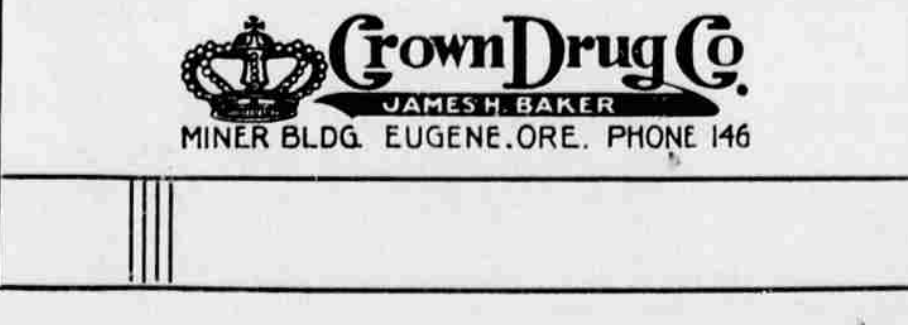
Women Playing Important Part in Aviation Nowadays
