

EUGENE WOMEN WIN PRIZES IN NATIONAL EVENT

Twelve Lane county women won prizes in the dressmaking contest conducted by the McMorran and Washburn stores for this district in the Borden Fabrics dressmaking contest. The prizes varied from \$10 to \$15. The contest opened the first of the year and closed on the last day of May. The contest was a national one. The United States being divided into four zones. Zone D, in which Eugene was included, was made up of Washington, Oregon, California, Idaho, Montana, Wyoming, Utah, Colorado, Arizona, Nevada, and New Mexico. 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wonderful to them and "did everything possible under the sun for us. They tried to speed us along as fast as we could go, hoping we would break all records to smithereens."

Except for having to fight weather most of the way across Siberia, the airmen said they had little trouble although their plane "bogged to her belly" when they set her down on a muddy field at Hissogvashensk.

Post and Gatty told their story as they sat near their plane on the field at Solomon, eating other food than that which had been prepared for them in Nome. They watched mechanics refuel and check over the entire ship before they climbed in for the start to Fairbanks.

"This is the first we have eaten of any good food since we left Moscow," Post said between mouthfuls of black bread each day and drank some strong tea. This fried chicken is fine. I'm as hungry and dry as a fish. Say, this coffee is the best I've had to drink in a week."

As the airmen prepared to start from Solomon for Fairbanks the plane wheels mired in the sand and the plane nosed over onto the propeller. The propeller was bent at both ends but after five minutes work with a hammer and piece of iron, Post pronounced it okay and climber aboard.

Gatty was badly shaken up when struck by the propeller but not seriously injured. The navigator, leaning over the propeller priming the engine when the heat of the engine fired four cylinders, bringing the propeller around and striking him over the heart.

BERLIN, June 30.—(AP)—Otto Hilg and Holger Holms, American transatlantic airmen, who arrived from Copenhagen yesterday, took off today for Gera in Thuringia enroute to Hillig's birthplace at Steinbrücke.

They planned to complete the flight to Steinbrücke tomorrow and then they will return to Berlin. Later in the week they are to go back to Copenhagen where they will be received by the king.

MAY FLY PACIFIC

SEATTLE, June 30.—(AP)—An attempted non-stop flight over the Pacific to Tokyo is proposed by Reginald L. Robbins and H. S. Jones, endurance fliers of Question Mark fame, as soon as they can make the necessary preparations for refueling in the air over Fairbanks and Nome, Alaska.

The fliers were expected to arrive here late today or tomorrow after a flight from Fort Worth, Tex. A trimotor plane, to be used in the refueling contacts, will go directly to Fairbanks.

Robbins and Jones, hoping to qualify for the \$25,000 prize offered by the Asahi Shimbun, Osaka newspaper, for the first non-stop flight between Japan and the United States, hope to establish a fueling contact over

Fairbanks, then proceed to Nome, with the trimotor plane following them with a large reserve supply of gasoline, and load up again before swimming across Bering sea and south along Kamchatka to Japan.

No date has been set for the start of the proposed flight.

NEW RECORD CLAIMED

PARIS, June 30.—(AP)—The French Aero club today received a telegram from the Mme. Maryse Bastie, French aviatrix, which was sent from Urino, a small town near Nijni Novgorod, Russia, and which said she had completed a straight flight from Le Bourget flying field. She left Le Bourget near Paris Sunday morning.

The distance is calculated to be about 1810 miles. It confirmed this would give her the world record for light airplanes. Her monoplane weighs about 600 pounds.

The previous record, aviation official said, was held by Barney Zimmerly, American flier, who did 1725 miles under similar circumstances.

Mme. Bastie flew a German monoplane with a French motor.

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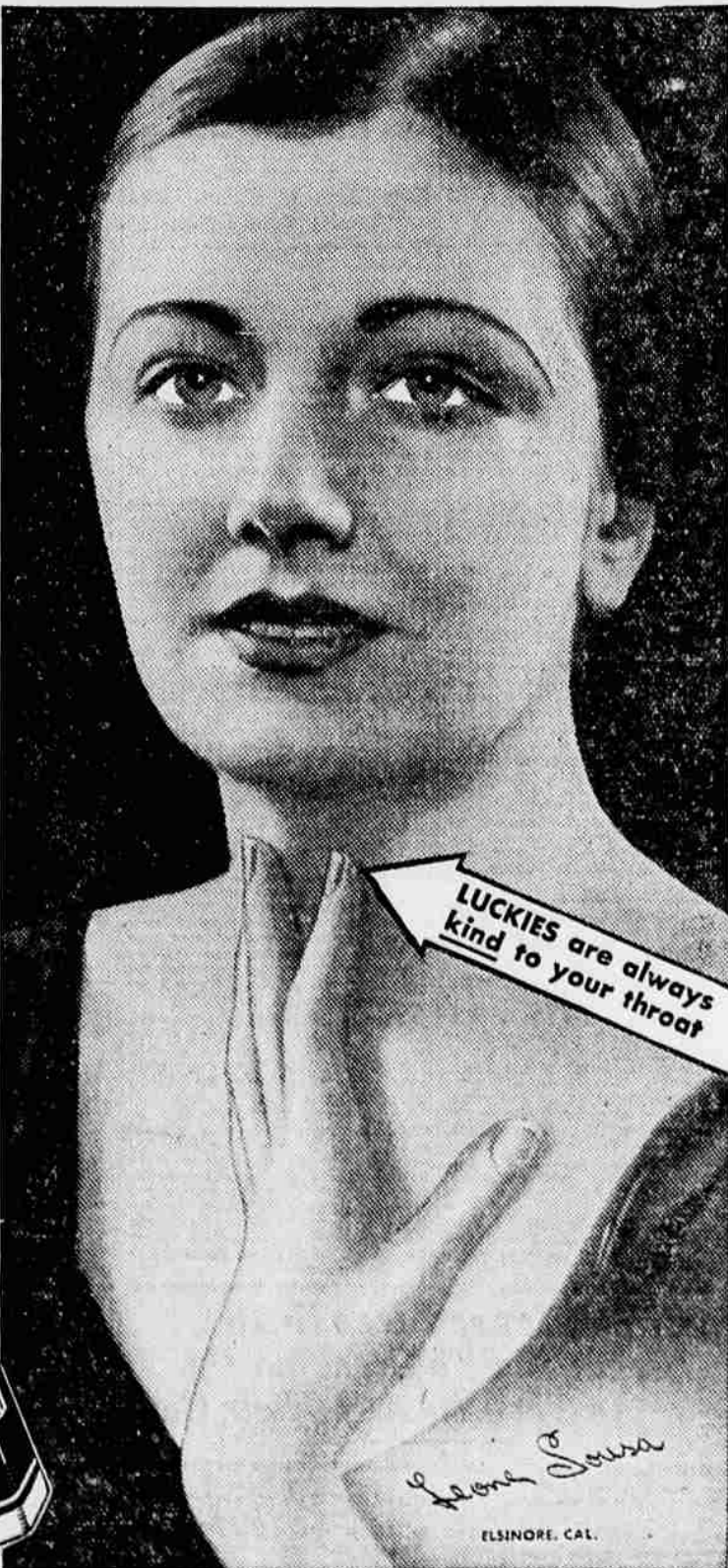
