Fred Smith, for 12 years a resident of Eugene, died at his home at 450 west Broadway Tuesday at the age of 47 years. He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Ella Smith and three sisters, Mrs. W. C. Fry of Carson, Wash., Mrs. J. S. Harrison of Oregon City and Mrs. Hattie Shogren of Toledo, Ore.

Mr. Smith was born at Grants Pass Nov. 9, 1884, and was a printer on the Rogue River Courier in that city for 29 years prior to coming to Eugene in 1910. He was a member of the Elks lodge at McMinnville, the Odd Fellows lodge at Grants Pass and the Eugene local of the International Typographical Union.

The remains will be sent by the Veatch funeral home of this city for interment at Grants Pass. The L. R. Hall funeral home there will have charge.

HARRISBURG, June 30.—(Special)—Francis R. Baker died at his home in Harrisburg Saturday evening. For a year or more he had been in ill health and the decline toward the end came rapidly. The funeral was held Tuesday afternoon at the Miner chapel and interment made in the Alford cemetery.

Francis R. Baker was born in Indiana, Nov. 27, 1870. In 1901 he was married to Miss Lila Tanton, who survives him. About 20 years ago he moved to Oregon, and has lived since at Harrisburg. Besides the widow, he leaves a son, Eli, and a daughter, Myrtle, and three half brothers.

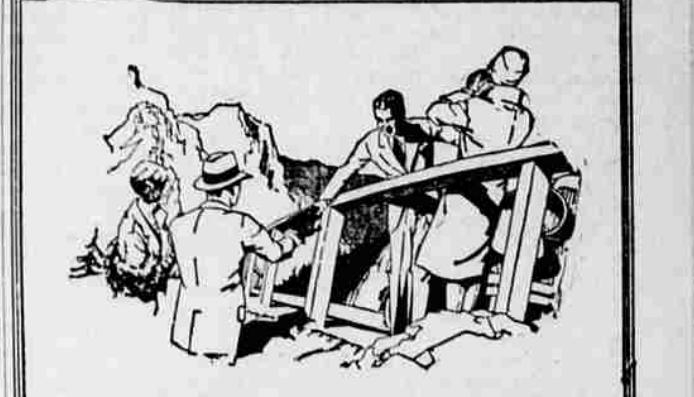
