

LOW GRAIN RATES APPROVED BY U. S. DISTRICT COURT

CHICAGO, July 1.—(AP)—An interstate commerce commission order for lower freight rates on grain in western trunk line territory, today had the approval of the United States district court.

The court yesterday dissolved a temporary injunction obtained by western carriers restraining the commission from putting its order into effect. At the same time the court filed its findings of fact and conclusions of law, indicating the opinion that the commission had not gone beyond its scope in ordering the reductions.

Attorneys for the railroads said the order probably would be appealed to the United States supreme court. Meanwhile, they added, the decision would not put the new rates into effect immediately, as a further order of the commission, giving the carriers fifteen days time, would be required.

The interstate commerce commission's order, raising freight rates on many coarse grains but reducing rates on wheat throughout the western district, was announced last July 2 and was to have gone into effect last Oct. 1. Its enforcement was postponed several times at the request of the railroads.

The temporary injunction was granted last May 7, a week before the date on which the railroads had been ordered to post the new rates. Public service commissions from several of the grain states argued against the railroads' attempt to block the new rates at a hearing in Chicago.

Education School Enrollment Grows

A phenomenal growth in the enrollment in the school of education, particularly in courses dealing with school administration, has taken place at the University of Oregon this summer, according to Dr. C. L. Huffaker, professor of education. The complexity of educational problems, intensified by the business depression, is largely the cause, he believes.

In the various courses in education given this summer there are nearly 650 enrollments, which are equivalent to over 300 full-time students, an exceptionally large number. This does not represent 450 students, however, as many of the students enroll in several different courses. Dr. Huffaker pointed out.

Of the total number of enrollments, nearly a third are graduate students, which is also an unusually high percentage, showing that teachers are finding an undergraduate course not nearly enough to take care of their needs in the modern day.
