New Paper Plan For Spanish City

MADRID.—(U.P.)—Madrid, which already has 15 daily newspapers, is scheduled to have another one soon. "Crucible," at present a tri-weekly, is scheduled to appear as a daily morning paper.

AUTO LICENSES STORY

(CONTINUED FROM PAGE 1)

plates for the period beginning tomorrow and ending June 30, 1932.

The statutory time for securing the new licenses expired at midnight last night.

The governor, in a letter to Secretary of State Hal E. Hoss said he believed some leeway should be granted because of the "present period of depression."

The governor's announcement was made after he had sent a letter to Secretary Hoss urging that motor vehicle owners be given a month's respite from arrest for driving with improper license plates.

SALEM, July 1.—(U.P.)—Demand for new automobile license plates, required by law to be on all automobiles in Oregon today, was noticeably on the wane following the statement last night by Governor Julius L. Meier that he would issue an unconditional pardon to any one arrested for not having new plates during July.

The falling off occurred suddenly, as up to last night the secretary of state's office reported counters in Portland and Salem branches jammed with applicants while the mails were loaded with applications. An estimated 140,000 licenses have been issued, which is considered about half of the automobile population. There was no rush for licenses this morning.

Hoss Adamant
The statement of the governor followed a refusal on the part of the secretary of state, Hal E. Hoss, to order traffic officers not to arrest license violators for one month. Hoss stated he had no authority to make such an order, which was requested by the governor, and reminded Meier that as "chief executive of the state you are the enforcement officer and such orders are in your hands."

Hoss further stated in reply to the announcement that the governor would pardon anyone arrested, that "your action will have the very material effect of stopping the purchase of license plates, throwing my organization into a bad condition, and interfering seriously with the collection of money now badly needed by the highway commission." Under the law, Hoss stated, he had no author-

SALEM, Ore., July 1.—(U.P.)—Preliminary initiative petitions seeking repeal of the state prohibition enforcement act were filed in the state department by George Rylander of Portland Tuesday.

The attorney general has prepared a ballot title for a similar petition previously filed by Harry Critchlow, of Portland.

The law provides that completed petitions shall contain signatures of 17,088 qualified voters and he filed with the secretary of state not later than July 3, 1932.
