

Eugene Tennis Stars Getting Ready For State And Local Tournaments

3 GO TO PORTLAND FOR OREGON MEET; SALEM ASKS MATCH

With six tournaments and meets definitely or tentatively scheduled for the next two weeks, players of the Eugene Lawn Tennis association are practicing daily to get in top form. Fresh from their 7 to 0 victory over the Corvallis Tennis club and its Oregon State college stars, the Eugene netmen are eyeing various fields to collect new honors.

Meets Listed

Here are the tournaments and meets listed for the Eugene players:

- 1—Eugene association ladder tournament, July 2.
- 2—Southern Oregon championships at Medford July 3, 4, and 5.
- 3—Salem meet at Eugene July 5 (tentative).
- 4—Oregon state championships, Portland, starting July 6.
- 5—Eugene Tennis association championships, July 6.
- 6—Marshfield meet at Eugene July 12.

Many Good Players

The membership of the club at present is made up of 17 players. Of these, at least 10 are Eugene of ability good enough to play in most of the meets. A six man team has been developed, made up of local and university stars.

The ladder tournament to determine the ratings of the players within the club will be held on the university courts starting Thursday. All players will be entered. Play to determine the singles champion and doubles champions of the club's own membership will be started Monday.

Three Emeo Title

Three members of the association have decided to go to Portland Monday and enter the Oregon state meet. Others may decide to go later. Those planning to go now are Joe Kallik, Oregon varsity player; Dick Goldthwaite, Oregon freshman star; and Jack Ahern, of the Oregon varsity. These men will be Eugene's best in the tournament, which has been entered by net stars from the entire coast.

The Southern Oregon championships and the meet Salem has asked for would come at the same time, and in case anyone from Eugene goes to Medford, the teams would be split and other members be called in the play at Salem. The Salem match has not been definitely scheduled. Salem will be played soon, however, if not this week-end. Eugene is undecided whether to have a representation at Medford, but some may decide at the last minute to go.

Marshfield will play here July 12. The team which will oppose them will probably be the Eugene team, composed of Kallik and Ahern, Goldthwaite, Kallik, Eugene V. Slattery, Overmeyer and Pete Buck.

AMERICAN TENNIS STAR WINS MATCH

WIMBLEDON STADIUM, Eng., July 1.—(AP).—Sidney B. Wood, Jr., 20-year-old American Davis cup player, today won his way to the finals of the Wimbledon tennis championships in a four set victory over Fred Perry, 21-year-old English player. The scores were 4-6, 6-2, 6-4, 6-2.

Playing brilliantly after the first set, in which he was wild, Wood went on to win from England's most promising younger player in decisive fashion.

It was a striking triumph for the cotton-haired New York boy who only attained top-flight tennis ranking last year and was playing for the second time at Wimbledon. As a youngster of 18 he entered the famous tournament but did not get far.

The meeting was the second between Wood and Perry, the American youngster having defeated the athletic son of a labor M. P. in a little tournament at Harrow four years ago. Perry then was an unknown suburban player, doing his practicing on the courts in the public parks.

Chili Aussem, Germany's ranking woman tennis player, today won her way to the semi-final round by defeating Miss Payot, of Switzerland, 2-6, 6-2, 6-1.

Fraulein Hilda Krahwinkel, the other German player, will play Miss Helen Jacobs, of Berkeley, Calif., in one semi-final match tomorrow while Miss Aussem plays Mme. Rene Mathieu, of France.

The veteran French doubles team of Henri Cochet and Jacques Brugnon defeated the Japanese pair of Iro Satoh and M. Kawachi 4-6, 7-5, 6-4 to enter the semi-finals. They will play Shields and Wood tomorrow.

AMERICAN LEAGUE LEADERS FINDING TOUGHER SLEDDING

The leaders of the American league pennant race, who threatened to leave the other teams so far behind that they would be practically out of sight, have found some tough sledding in the past two weeks. They are not yet in serious danger, for the real "meat" that has arisen during their western tour has come from the St. Louis Browns, who were in last place when the trouble started.

After rushing far ahead of all the teams except Washington, the champion Philadelphia Athletics have secured just eight victories to six defeats in Cleveland, highest ranking western team, still to be faced twice more. And to make things look a bit tougher for the A's, the three aces of their pitching staff, wabbling badly at times have accounted for all but one of these victories.

Earnshaw Wins

George Earnshaw turned in his second victory of the tour yesterday as the Athletics' slugger brought an 18 to 7 victory over Cleveland in the series opener. He was pitching badly toward the end, giving nine of the Indians' 12 hits in the last two innings but the A's already had put the game away, hammering Brown and Lawson for 17 hits.

Washington was dropped to an even break for the 14 games in the west as the Browns landed them one of their worst beatings of the season by a 7 to 0 count. It was the first time all season the Senators had been shut out of it, giving one hit in the first inning and another in the ninth. It was the Browns' 12th victory in 14 games at home against eastern clubs.

Boston Takes One

Boston, weakest of the eastern clubs, pulled its average up a little by stepping out behind the six hit pitching of Danny MacFadden to beat the Chicago White Sox 7 to 1. Detroit scored three runs in the eleventh inning after the New York Yankees had tallied twice and won by an 8 to 7 count. Lou Gehrig prolonged the game by hitting his 19th homer of the season to tie the score in the ninth.

The St. Louis Cardinals, who seem to have the "Indian Sign" on their nearest rivals, the New York Giants, increased their lead in the National league race to 3 1/2 games by beating the Giants 11 to 10 for their second victory in the important series. The game was a slugfest which produced 18 hits for the Giants, 14 for the Cards and five homers, including one by Pinch Hitter Ethan Allen with the bases full.

Robins Drop Back

The Brooklyn Robins, who were threatening third place, dropped back again as the Cincinnati Reds won a close game 4 to 3. The Reds got an early lead that lasted when Benny Frey weakened toward the end. Chicago and Boston each picked up a game in this part of the struggle, placing the Cubs a game and a half ahead of the Robins and Boston only a game behind. Manager Rogers Hornsby accounted for seven runs with a pair of homers as the Cubs walloped the Phillies 14 to 3. Fred Frankhouse pitched the Braves to a 5 to 1 victory over the Pittsburgh Pirates, allowing only five hits.

CATCHES BIG FISH

Stribling Defies Advisors And Rides Over Schmeling's Camp In His Fast Airplane

GEAUGA LAKE, Ohio, July 1.—(AP).—Young Stribling's airplane ride to Max Schmeling's training camp in defiance of Madison Square Garden officials and his father-in-law and many persons wondering today if the Georgian doesn't plan to throw caution to the wind in Friday night's bout in the new Cleveland stadium, "I feel better now than any time since I started training," Stribling remarked. "That ride was just what I needed."

Those close to Stribling know that the Georgia boy has his heart set on trying to knock out Schmeling. Pa, however, favors a safer course.

"We know the value of a knock-out," said Pa. "But we want to win this fight. It might be better not to risk losing it by trying for a knock-out."

Many camp followers believe that Stribling has tipped his hand by the airplane ride, and that he won't take any advice from anybody unless it suits his own idea.

It has been said that Stribling wanted to try to knock out Sharkey in the first few rounds in their bout at Miami Beach, but listened to Pa who urged him to play it safe. Since losing that bout, Stribling has been fighting pretty much the way he wants to.

Stribling has had almost 1000 hours in the air. He first started flying five years ago, and has been in one slight crack-up.

Those who have questioned Stribling's courage in the ring after some of his bad fights can't understand why he has so much nerve when he's in a plane. The Georgian always has been a fiend on speed. He'll ride anything that goes fast.

When he passed over Schmeling's camp during the German's workout yesterday he flew low and yelled: "Hello Maxie." He dove straight for a water tower at Conneaut lake, and plummeted by more than 100 miles an hour.

HORSES ARRIVING FOR CELEBRATION HERE JULY 4 AND 5

Horses may be just horses to some people, but it takes a lot of different kinds to make a Fourth of July celebration. Out at the Lane county fairgrounds, they're bringing them in by the carload, and almost every type of horse known to man will be on hand for the Pioneer Days blow-out.

First and foremost, there are the racing horses that will see action in the racing events on the afternoons of July 4 and 5. Then there are the rodeo horses. These include the domesticated cow ponies who will be used in rounding up the bucking horses, bucking steers, wild bulls and wild cows, and their include as well the bucking horses themselves. These are outlaw animals with fire in their eyes who have been shipped in from the Klamath Falls country to provide plenty of material for the buckaroos to work on.

Henry Christensen, youthful cowboy star who is in charge of the rodeo, which will be one of the feature attractions of the big Fourth of July celebration, has been rounding up his horses, cattle and steers this week.
