

MONTHLY REPORT SHOWS JUNE WET, VERY COOL HERE

June had low maximum temperatures on the average and brought the second heaviest precipitation for June on record, the monthly report from G. M. de Broekert, weather observer, shows.

Rainfall for the month totaled 2.53 inches, an amount exceeded only by June of 1929 in the past eight years. In 1929 it rained 3.55 inches in June. Although the mercury did reach 91 on June 6, in previous years the maximum has gone as high as 100. Although it was comparatively cool for the month, in previous years the minimum has gone as low as 37, 38, and 39 during June.

There were 12 clear days, seven partly cloudy, and 10 cloudy days for the month. The river's highest stage for the month was minus one-tenth of a foot and the lowest stage was minus two feet, both low marks.

Following is a chart on the rainfall for June during the past eight years: 1921, 2.53 inches; 1922, 1.02 inches; 1923, 3.55 inches; 1924, 1.8 of an inch; 1925, 1.52 inches; 1926, .23 of an inch; 1927, .87 of an inch; 1928, .26 of an inch; 1929, 3.55 inches.

A chart on the highest maximum and lowest minimum for June of the past eight years reads as follows: 1921, 91 and 40; 1922, 92 and 38; 1923, 90 and 37; 1924, 88 and 41; 1925, 89 and 39; 1926, 90 and 42; 1927, 100 and 41; 1928, 98 and 41; 1929, 90 and 39.

Stages of the river for the month in the past eight years for highest and lowest read: 1921, .1 of a foot and .2 feet; 1922, .24 feet and zero; 1923, .6 of a foot and .6 of a foot; 1924, .88 feet and 1.1 feet; 1925, .5 of a foot and .2 of a foot; 1926, .48 feet and 1.8 feet; 1927, .21 feet and one foot; 1928, .56 feet and 3.4 feet.

SHIPPERS MEET IN EUGENE THURSDAY

Arthur M. Geary of Portland was expected to be present at the meeting of shippers from Lane county and other points in the upper valley here Thursday afternoon. Mr. Geary is attorney for the Northwest Shippers Traffic league and the Northwest Farm Rate council. He was to address the meeting called at 2:30 o'clock at the chamber of commerce.

At this gathering it was expected that an organization of local shippers would be perfected and a resolution was to be introduced asking the Interstate Commerce commission to investigate shipping conditions in the Pacific northwest before passing upon the application of the railways asking for a 15 per cent advance in freight rates.

Various farm organizations in Lane county and co-operative shipping organizations were represented in the meeting here. W. A. Ayres of Eugene, president of the Farm Rate council, had called the meeting and presided.

Experts to Make Their Own Quakes

CAMBRIDGE, Mass.—(U.S.)—Harvard seismologists are "manufacturing" earthquakes in an investigation of the foundation on which continents rest.

Made by a small charge of dynamite the shocks used in these experiments move the ground so little that instruments which magnify a disturbance 12,000 times are needed to record them.

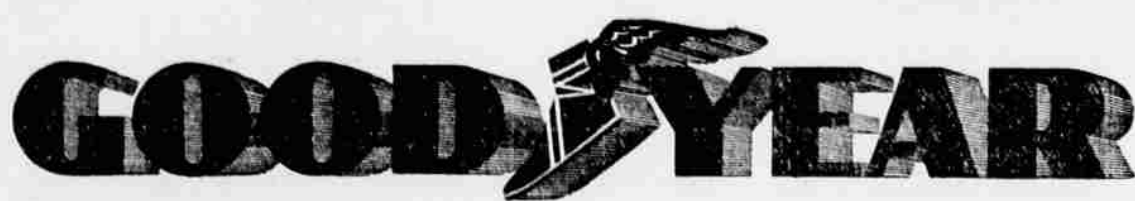
