

LANE PIONEER IS VISITOR IN CITY

C. E. Powers, Lane county pioneer, is here for a four-day visit with relatives and friends. He is living now in the Odd Fellows home in Portland where he has been for the past three years.

Mr. Powers carried mail in 1875 with John Craig, early-day mail carrier who lost his life on the McKenzie pass. "I knew John Craig well and there wasn't a finer man. He'd divide his last crust with those in need. I knew him from 1862 on," Mr. Powers said.

In 1881, Mr. Powers carried mail through the great high water period that swept the valley that year. "Fifty-five miles up the McKenzie, the water was way over the banks, so you know what it was through the valley," Mr. Powers commented. When he started from Eugene in January of that year there was an inch of snow and it became deeper as he got into the foothills. Then the temperature moderated and a heavy rain set in, flooding everything. He met the mail at McKenzie Bridge to bring it on into Eugene and says he went through some of the most terrible experiences of his life. He had to leave his horse and lead it up the trail, walking better than 60 pounds. He took another horse which had to swim the river three times within 20 miles. Again he had to leave his horse and walk 16 miles. He kept the struggle up until he reached Eugene, going through mud and water up to his hips and shoulders. "They gave me a great ovation when I reached Eugene with the mail from eastern Oregon," Mr. Powers said. "Abe" Patterson was postmaster here then.

Mr. Powers was down for both of Eugene's pioneer celebrations, the Trail to Rail, and the Sunset Trail pageants. He is on a two-week vacation and will be here in visiting Mrs. Annie O'Brien, Miss Agnes O'Brien, and Percy O'Brien.

"Uncle Charlie" Powers, as he is known, was born in Lane county, September 20, 1853.

The Islander sank in August, 1902, and estimates have been made that \$300,000 worth of gold or more went down.

Miss Clithero graduated from the University of Oregon in 1930 and was well known on the campus for her writing. She majored in the university school of journalism and for some time was campus correspondent for the Eugene Guard.
