Loses One Eye
Then came misfortune. While working at a machine shop at Holdenville he lost the sight of one eye. This would have been enough to discourage most youths from hopes of an air career. Lewis said he did his first jump beautifully, which a beginner does not often do. It was but a step from "air stunt man" to "air pilot" and Wiley soon was touring the pasture circuit in an old Canuck with his own hands at the controls.

THE DALLIES, Ore., July 3.—(U.P.)—Meat dealers of The Dalles late yesterday were fined a total of \$350 on charges involving illegal handling of salmon, following a day of investigation by Master Fish Warden M. T. Hoy and H. S. Smith, auditor for the state fish commission.

The City Market, Inc., paid a fine of \$100 on charges of handling fish illegally caught during the closed commercial season. R. F. Taylor paid a \$250 fine on charges of purchasing salmon and failing to report the purchase and pay the poundage fee. Both proprietors pleaded guilty.

While commercial fishermen were arrested early in the season on various charges, the arrest of the dealers was the first here this year involving retail handlers of commercial salmon.

OFFICERS FACING PUNISHMENT FOR LOSS OF VESSEL

SAN FRANCISCO, July 3.—(U.P.)

The wreck of the coastwise liner Harvard on the shoals of Point Arguello last Memorial day brought Captain L. B. Hillsinger under a four months suspension today for failing to take the proper means to avert the mishap.

Captain John K. Bulger of the U. S. Steamboat Service, who conducted an inquiry into the accident, also suspended Second Officer George H. McVickers for one year because of "inattention to duty and unskillfulness" and Third Officer Oscar Anderson for 15 days for "conduct unbecoming an officer."

McVickers was in charge when the Harvard struck the reef and caused the loss of the \$200,000 vessel and its \$200,000 cargo. Bulger's findings included:

1. That McVickers failed to report the dangerous position of the Harvard to Captain Hillsinger even after he knew it.

2. That Hillsinger, once he learned the Harvard was dangerously near shore, ordered a "minor change in direction—one that would not have averted the grounding"—instead of ordering full speed astern.

3. That Anderson made an inaccurate entry in the "rough log."

Anderson's punishment, it was explained, was only exemplary and he was suspended to emphasize the nautical axiom that "none but accurate entries are of any service in any log." His suspension started as of June 30 and those of Hillsinger and McVickers as of June 22.

The Harvard had more than 500 passengers and crew members aboard when she ran onto the reef in the early morning hours. A calm sea permitted a quick transfer of passengers to lifeboats and within a few hours all were picked up by the cruiser Louisville.

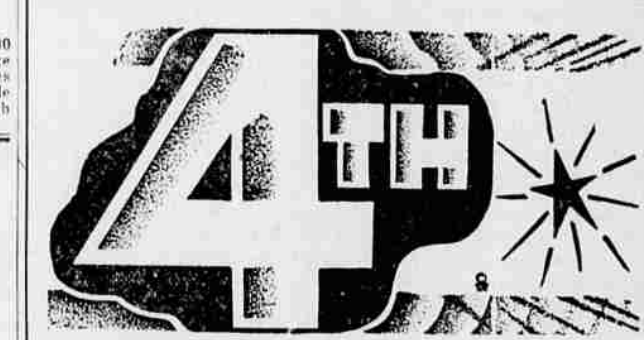
Congregationalists May Buy Parsonage
