PROTEST IS SENT FARM BOARD ON STATEMENTS MADE

MINNEAPOLIS, July 4.—(AP)—C. B. Rogers, chairman of the Minneapolis chamber of commerce committee on public relations, yesterday sent a telegram to James C. Stone, Washington, chairman of the federal farm board, protesting against statements made by Mr. Stone attacking the grain trade.

"Assuming you were quoted correctly in dispatches appearing in today's newspapers, the grain trade of the northwest deeply resents the continued accusation that the failure of the federal farm board has been due to opposition from this industry," said the telegram.

"The policies of the board in connection with the handling of wheat has been characterized by a series of costly blunders, many of which might have been avoided had the board been willing to take competent advice. Whenever the disastrous effects of these policies have become apparent, however, and the farm board has found itself under criticism and the farmers themselves dissatisfied, the board has sought to excuse its own mistakes by attempting to make the grain trade a convenient scape-goat."

HUFF FIRES STATEMENT

CHICAGO, July 4.—(AP)—C. E. Huff, president of the Farmer's National Grain corporation, has issued a statement asking the nation's farmers to prevent politicians from making the agricultural marketing act a 1932 issue for votes.

He added that two principal obstacles to adequate relief were "politicians and pseudo-farm leaders with political ambitions and partisanship and selfish interests seeking to profit from handling farm products regardless of the price received by the producers."

HOOVER OFF FOR BRIEF CAMP REST

ORANGE, Va., July 4.—(AP)—For the first time in a week, President Hoover tonight dropped the cares of the executive offices for a brief respite in the Virginia woods.

Although fatigued by the strain of the moratorium discussions with France, the chief executive kept in constant touch with developments today in Washington and Paris. His camp on the Rapidan is connected by direct telephone with the White House.

The drive from the White House to the camp afforded him his first relaxation from official duties in a week.

Considerable holiday traffic made the drive tedious. Several times the president and cars following his party were forced to a slow pace by traffic jams. A slight drizzle fell during part of the trip. Lowering skies hung over the camp at nightfall.

Duke of Aosta Passes Saturday

TURIN, Italy, July 4.—(AP)—The Duke of Aosta died at 1:30 o'clock this afternoon.

The duke, cousin to the King of Italy, several times during his life time was mentioned as a candidate for the Italian throne. He also might have been king of France, but political fortunes were against him.

During the war he won fame as a soldier but sacrificed his health. Bronchial and lung affections endangered his life several times. A weak heart complicated his illness and during recent years he lived in retirement.

The duke was 62 years old.

His chronic illness became critical a week ago and the king of Italy visited his bedside.

Hitlerites Arrested By Bavarian Police

MUNICH, Germany, July 4.—(AP)—Adolf Hitler's party headquarters, the palatial "Brown House" was occupied today by the Bavarian state police.

All national socialist members wearing their brown shirt regalia in defiance of a police ban were booked at a police station and released.

LOS ANGELES, July 4.—(AP)—Having selected Atlantic City, N. J., for their 1932 meeting, teachers and school officials attending the National Educational association convention here were enroute to their homes or on vacation trips today.

Twenty-two thousand persons, it was estimated by Willis A. Sutton, retiring president, were here for the 69th annual meeting of the association. This is more than twice the number attending any previous convention, he said. More than 300 addresses were made before the association or its divisional sessions.

Washington, D. C., was a close runner-up in the race for the next convention. Miss Florence M. Hale of Augusta, Me., is the new association president.

Polish Memorial To War President Is Unveiled

POZNAN, Poland, July 4.—(AP)—The Woodrow Wilson memorial, designed by Gustaw Borghum and presented by Ignace Paderewski, was unveiled today, the war president's widow and Poland's highest government officials participating.

A message from President Hoover paid tribute to the part Polish men and women played in the development of the United States.

"Despite the distances of space and the differences of speech which separate Poland and the United States, there are circumstances which make it natural for me to express an especial interest in this ceremony," the president said.

"It has been my own good fortune to visit Poland, has been my good fortune to meet the illustrious citizen of Poland to whose inspiration this gathering is due. It has been my good fortune to know President Wilson, to whom it was given to play part in the history of Poland."

"In so doing, he cannot have been forgetful of another stormy moment of the world's affairs, when Kosciuszko, Palaski, and other Polish volunteers making their way across seas so much wider and more untraveled than they now are, fought in the ragged regiments of Washington."

"The intervening century and a half having renewed and multiplied past all count these old relations between the people of our two countries, it is therefore particularly touching to us that a ceremony such as this should take place in Poland, on the anniversary which stands first in our calendar."

"In the name of the people of the

United States, as in my own, I wish to give voice to our profound appreciation of so notable a mark of remembrance, sympathy, and friendship."

The ceremony was marked by many expressions of enthusiasm for Mr. Wilson, the United States and Paderewski. The pianist was unable to be present because of the illness of his wife in Switzerland. He is with her.

Major Ratajski said in his address that no one feared or envied the greatness of the United States because the United States clearly recognized that her own welfare was the welfare of all nations.

"The man whose memory we honor today," the mayor declared, "illustrated that attitude in his career and it is once more illustrated by Herbert Hoover, who again is leading the United States in action for the general welfare."

President Meszicki of Poland sent the following message to President Hoover:

"On the occasion of the American national holiday I am anxious to renew to your excellency my own and the Polish nation's best wishes for the happiness of the great American republic. I desire to express deep gratification that the traditional friendship uniting both our nations finds this year especially cordial expression in the solemn commemoration of memories revived today by the inauguration at Poznan of the monument to President Wilson, an inauguration at which I was anxious to preside personally."

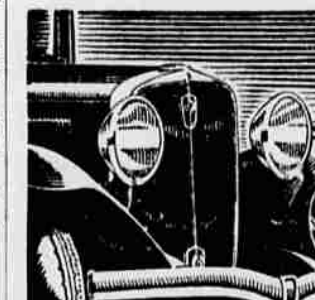
