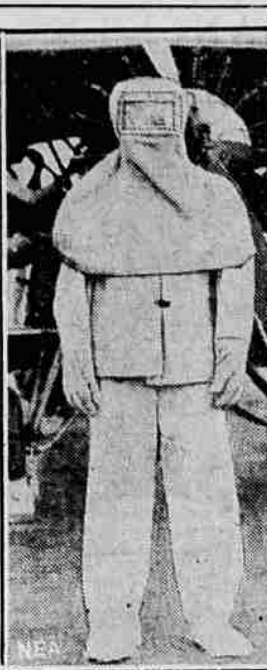

## MAN JAILED FOR STEALING CHECK

SACRAMENTO, Cal., July 6.—(U.P.)—Charged with stealing a government check for \$15,000 from a post-office box in Klamath Falls, Ore., Jake Renie, alias Jim Wilson, and Jim Baker, was held by police here today.

Renie was arrested shortly after attempting to cash the check in payment for a light truck. At first he denied stealing the check, saying he found it in a Klamath Falls pool room. Later, when confronted by postal detectives, he confessed stealing the check and another check for \$20 from postoffice boxes in Klamath Falls.

The theft was discovered when Renie went to a local automobile concern, signed an order for the truck and attempted to get \$200 on the check. He was told to return later. Meanwhile the management got in touch with the firm of Dunn and Baker, at Klamath Falls, to whom the check was drawn, and learned it had been stolen.

The sheriff's office at Klamath Falls has been notified and an extradition agent with requisition papers was expected this week.

## Chamber to Meet At Springfield

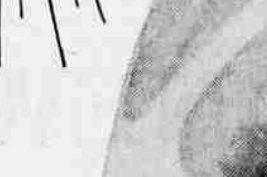
SPRINGFIELD, July 6.—(Special).—The regular meeting of the Springfield chamber of commerce will be held Tuesday evening.

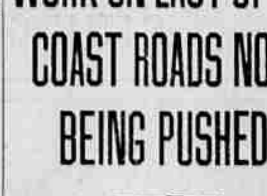

## WORK ON LAST OF COAST ROADS NOW BEING PUSHED ON



The Ten Mile-Indian creek road project, on which Lane county and the government forest service are working this summer, represents the last of the loop roads to the Oregon coast highway from the Lane county interior, it was pointed out Monday by County Commissioner Clinton Hurd.

This stretch of road, when completed a few seasons hence, will extend up Indian creek from the Siuslaw highway near Swishone, thence across a bump and down the west side to Ten Mile creek, and down that creek to the Oregon coast highway.

The county will start crushing rock this week to be placed on the Indian creek side of the project on road which has been graded by the forest service. The Siuslaw national forest, in which the project lies, has been pushing this work with a partial crew this summer, and is now working on the coast side of the route.

Construction of a 50-foot span across Ten Mile creek is another part of the job to be completed this summer.

Commissioner Hurd pointed out that the completion of this and other current projects will give three routes to the coast from Florence north—one by the main river highway, or by the North Fork, the second by way of Big Creek, and the third by Indian and Ten Mile creeks.

The Big Creek road is a summer route at present, although a school teacher who lived on the west side of the loop there drove across each day last winter to teach school at Pavn postoffice. The road leads from Minerva north to Pavn and west to Big Creek.

Mr. Hurd counts the North Fork and main river roads as a single route because each leads to the same point on the coast. There is, to the south, still another road—the old route, the Siuslaw river road, over to Smith river and down to the coast. This is a wild, uninhabited country, and the road is hardly passable.

"It would seem we will have roads enough when we stretch down Ten Mile creek and finish other cut-offs and projects on the other routes. We will then have a fine main highway and two other loop roads leading to coast points north of Florence. There don't seem to be any other logical places to cut through the mountains."

## WILEY POST STORY

much more preferable to a married man.

Wiley served as personal pilot for Mr. Hall for some time. Once, down in Texas in 1923, near Lubbock, their plane nosed over and was badly damaged. "I was kind of scared," Hall said, "but nobody was badly hurt."

The oil man sold his plane however, and Wiley was without a job. But there was another place waiting for him on the Pacific coast.

Wiley had taken a plane to Burbank where the Lockheed aircraft factory is located. He flew the ship around California until he sold it for the company. The aircraft company officials liked the quiet, competent pilot and told him if he ever needed a job, one would be waiting for him at Burbank.

**Chief Test Pilot**

For a little more than a year Wiley was chief test pilot at the Lockheed factory, all the time carrying on the training that has made him not only

one of the best pilots but a skilled mechanic, thoroughly versed in the type of plane used in the round the world flight.

A friend in Washington, D. C., said that Wiley knows more about that type of plane than any other individual now.

A test pilot's job calls for competence in many phases of flying. It is admittedly one of the most difficult jobs in aviation, but Wiley took it in his stride as he took the other steps in his career. It was his job and he did it.

Russell Pecht, superintendent of the aircraft factory at Burbank, credits the preparations and ability to foresee circumstances of the world wars with the success of the project.

**A "Nice Trip"**

Pecht said Post was as silent on the coast as he is credited with being in Oklahoma. Once when the pilot made a record flight from Seattle to Los Angeles with four passengers aboard, Pecht recalled that while the passengers were elated over the trip, Post "didn't seem to think much about it, and only said, 'It was a nice trip.'"

Evidently Post has much the same feeling about his world jaunt. He came to New York back in 1927, via Berlin, Moscow and certain other points. He knew he must make careful preparations. He realized he would need gasoline, oil, maps and weather information. Once he had these and the other necessary equipment all he had to do was to fly around. It was just a job and he did it.

"That fellow Post was the most unworldly man that ever flew across the Atlantic," is the way Al Hink, superintendent of the service department at Roosevelt field sizes up the Oklahoma farm boy who streaked around the world to a place in future school books.

tendent of Polk county, to the effect that the high school tuition fund law, which was all right for the schools but not for the taxpayers in general.

**To Eliminate Features**  
County Clerk W. B. Dillard said that he is working on proposed legislation which would elim-

inate objectionable features of the present laws and give a fair and impartial plan for high school financing. He said he hoped to enlist general support for the plan, and have it introduced at the next session of the legislature.

When told of the board's action, Superintendent Gould stated he had put the facts as he seen them before the board and that a legal test would probably be the next step. He said that the discrediting of the Wheeler law would have saved the taxpayers of district No. 4, the Eugene district, approximately two mills.

At present, he said, a taxpayer inside Eugene district pays between 7 and 8 mills toward high school costs. A taxpayer just outside the district, who may send his children to the Eugene school for no extra cost, pays only 1.8 mills.
