On Saturdays, all cherry deliveries must be in by 2 o'clock and Saturday deliveries must be in by 3 o'clock in the afternoon.

SALEM, July 7.—(AP)—Two important meetings are scheduled for the state capitol this week, one to deal with county and local tax problems and the other on shippers' protest of the proposed 15 per cent increase in freight rates on railroads.
Other sessions, including the regular monthly board meeting, and a meeting concerning Champoez park policies are on the calendar for the week.
The big tax meeting will be held in the senate chamber Wednesday at 11 a. m., when 70 representatives from all 36 counties in the state will assemble at the call of Governor Julius L. Meier. The representatives were appointed by the governor last week, and have been called to consider tax reduction in counties and cities, to work in with the work of the executive in an attempt to reduce state taxes.
Thursday afternoon in the public hearing room of the public utilities commission, shippers from over the state will meet to plan a definite campaign of protest against the freight rate increase as requested in a petition before the interstate commerce commission. The state has already formally protested the rate, and A. F. Harvey this week is in attendance at the protest meeting at Salt Lake City, called by public utility commissions of western states. Commissioner Charles M. Thomas called the meeting.
State supreme court opinions, usually handed down on Tuesdays, this week will be returned on Wednesday. Chief Justice Henry J. Bean, who went to Pendleton over the holiday period, was not expected back until tomorrow night, necessitating delay in the court's action.

Floyd C. Wooton, of Stanford university, will address the discussion group of P. Lambda Theta, national education honorary organization for women, Tuesday evening at 7:30 in Gerlinger hall. This is open to anyone who is interested, according to Hilda Lobnitz, chairman. Mr. Wooton will speak on "Some Aspects of European Education."

STATE MEETINGS ON SCHEDULE AT SALEM THIS WEEK

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83 Chinese Said Victims of Race Clashes in Korea

TOKIO, July 7.—(AP)—Eighty-three Chinese have been killed in clashes with Koreans near Hailo, Korea, according to official advices received here today.
Sixty-eight Chinese men and three women were killed and 10 men and two women died later in hospitals from wounds. Sixty-four men and three women are in hospitals seriously injured.
An attack on three Japanese policemen by Chinese officials was reported here from Changchun, near where the original Korean-Chinese outbreaks occurred during an argument over rice fields. The policemen when returning to Changchun from Wampochoan, where they had gone to protect Koreans, were attacked by angry Chinese villagers.
One of the three officers was detained at Kuanchenctze.

Linfield Events to Attract Baptists

where he was forced down 15 miles from the nearest house and 25 miles from the nearest town.
He landed near a pipeline which he followed to the nearest settlement, through the heat of a blistering desert sun.
It was there that his stubbornness—or doggedness—came into play, for he refused to move on in the plane until it had been equipped with a new motor. He waited there for two weeks until a new power plant had been installed and he could fly away.
His friends further say that he often flies by "sense of feel" and that on cross-country hops he would neither look at a compass nor at maps. Fortunately he did not rely upon this system on his world trip, for at times over stretches of the flight, the instruments of Navigator Harold Gatty were all that saved the intrepid pilots from serious deviation from their course.
Wiley also is known as something of a "daredevil" although he has never been known to take any chances until the groundwork has been laid thoroughly. Perhaps the "daredevil" description is a hang-over from the days when Wiley was wing-walking and parachute jumping with the barnstorming "air circuses" in the southwest.
Post is exceptionally thorough in his preparations for any undertaking. He neither smokes nor drinks because he doesn't believe such habits fit in with good flying. He keeps himself in good physical trim at all times and although he is but 5 feet 5 inches tall none of the mental or physical tasks of flying tire him.
Russell Peck, who worked with Post on the coast, points out that one of the most difficult things a flier faces is taking off a ship heavily laden with gasoline.
"When a plane is heavily loaded with gas it takes tremendous exertion to get the tail up," Peck says.
