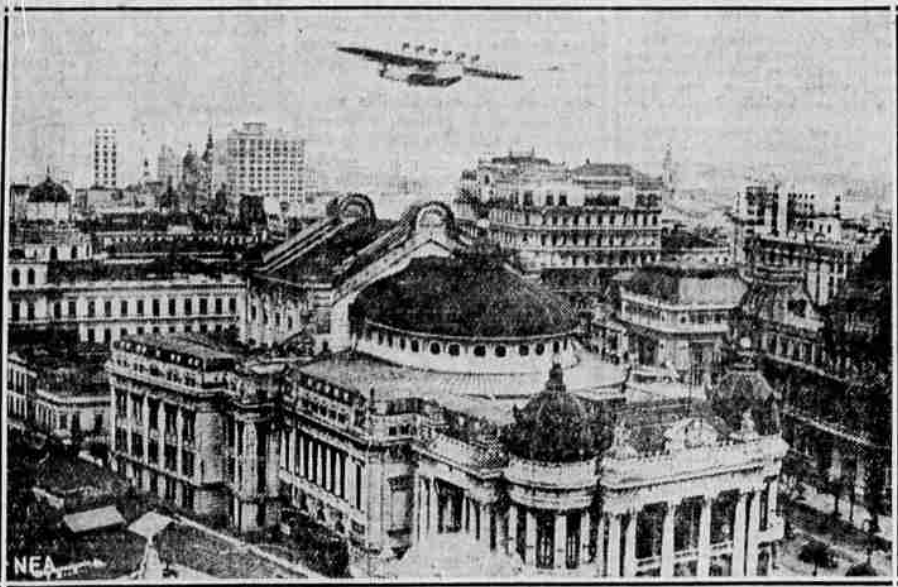
ENTERTAINMENT SET

Fire Breaks Out In State Hospital

SALEM, July 7.—(AP)—Fire which broke out on the north side of the state hospital for the insane shortly before 3 o'clock yesterday, for a time threatened the entire building in which about 2,000 inmates are housed. The flames were held under control by the sprinkler system until the Salem fire department arrived and put out the fire.

Sparks from the blow torches used in removing the paint from the outside of the building struck the roof of the three-story structure, started the fire, and in a short time the entire section was in flames. About 300 inmates were removed from six wards, two of which contained hospitalized patients. No one was injured, but water damage in that section was greater than that done by the fire.

REV. E. G. O. GROAT DIES; 97 YEARS OLD

COTTAGE GROVE, July 7.—(Special)—Rev. Elson G. O. Groat, organizer of the Baptist church in Cottage Grove, and licensed preacher for more than 72 years, died Monday at his home here at the age of 97 years. He came to Cottage Grove more than 25 years ago.

Rev. M. Groat was born near Syracuse, N. Y. January 30, 1834. At the age of 10 years he went to Chicago by water, there being no railway transportation there. He enlisted for service in the Civil war, but was rejected because of rheumatism trouble.

More than 72 years ago he was licensed to preach in Marion, Linn county, Iowa. He preached 30 years in Iowa, four years in Washington, 12 years in California, one year in Nebraska, and more than 17 years in Oregon. He helped to construct the building for the Baptist church here with his own hands and Mrs. Groat turned the first soil for the building.

During his long service in the church, Rev. Mr. Groat organized 35 churches. For one year and a half he was Sunday school missionary in Illinois. For some time he was pastor at the Cottage Grove church.

Rev. Mr. Groat is survived by his wife, Mrs. Corn Groat, two daughters, Mrs. R. G. Elder of Spokane, Wash., and Mrs. Lizzie Sickles of Shields cemetery at Cottage Grove.

This building was built about 55 years ago by the late Robert Griffith and W. T. Gray, carpenters, assisted by O. O. Ventch, who is now in the real estate business in Cottage Grove. It was built for the Larch brothers who were in business on the west side of the river. Mr. and Mrs. Ben Larch both worked in the store for many years and had many friends in this city, the Larch store being the only general store in Cottage Grove in the early days.

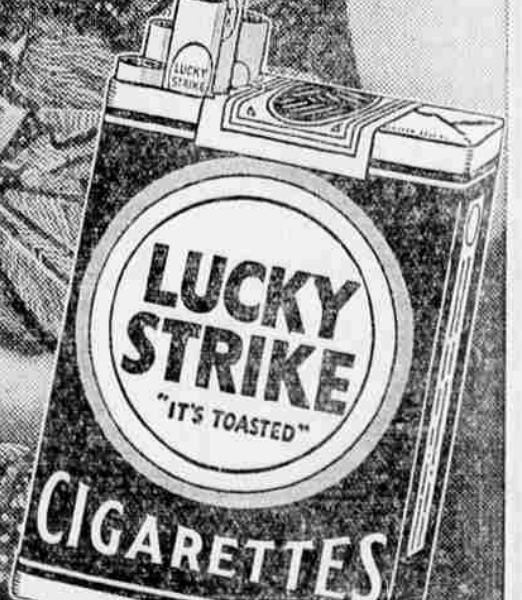
