Discussing the world economic situation, Bukharin said the Marxists had long predicted the decline.

"I think only extremely shallow-minded persons could have regarded the American prosperity as a fact of all but everlasting duration," he said. "The most extensive literature exists on the subject of crisis since 1825, showing that periodically shake capitalist economic."

Situation Different
"But the present crisis is different from all others in that it had developed into a general decline of capitalism and consequently, is unusually intense."

Asked for a solution, he replied:
"One thing is certain, there is no lasting solution in the framework of the capitalist system. In order to do away with crises it is necessary (1) to create an enormous consumption demand from the masses by change in social conditions of those masses by raising beyond the bounds of capitalism; and (2) by creating a planned economy in general, which is equally impossible under capitalism."

All projects of planning under capitalism are attempts to invent wooden iron and dry water. Propaganda for return of the pre-machine mode of production is equivalent to preaching that man should do away with clothes and grow hair all over his body and beset himself to the forests. Doctrine Reactionary
"Such a doctrine is simultaneously reactionary and utopian. The true way

It is not by way of a return to old forms but by going to forms higher than capitalism. That is, by transferring to a socialist planned economy. "The Soviets found this way out. We have no crises, nor can be have any. We have no unemployment."

For instance, the theme of Comrade Stalin's speech was not that we should reduce our rate of development, but that we must accelerate that rate. For this very purpose it is imperative that the instructions be carried out with determination.

"Comrade Stalin spoke of the non-party workers and the necessity of attracting them into the work to a greater extent because the phase of specialists (former Czarists) is now practically past, although there are still verities of sabotage."

"The enemies of the working class inside the country have been shattered fundamentally and completely. One may now see an enormous preponderance of the intelligent turning to side of the government."

acclaim reserved only for the most illustrious heroes. World known dignitaries joined famed air argonauts in lauding the feat. Past thronging thousands, Post, the one time air circus performer who did "death-defying stunts" in a scarcely populated section of the southwest was glory-borne, the target of proud eyes. Weary, but happy, the man who ventured only "sleep" when he thundered home, and the one who had seen New York's trail for the mighty.

This aviator who got his first training as a wing walker and parachute jumper was called a "citizen of the world."

His pretty young wife, with whom he eloped about four years ago in a plane, was on hand to tell her pride with hugs and kisses and little joyful shrieks. From her Mayville, Okla., home came the "delight" of a mother that her boy "had realized his dream," the "boy" who, as a little fellow, was "full of pranks" and preferred reading adventure books with his eyes on the sky.

Best Pilot in World
E. C. Hall, the oil man who backed him, was there to let his friend know that he was "the best pilot in the world" and the flight was "the greatest of all time."

To the national capital Wiley went with his pal Harold to gather more laurels and to receive acclaim paid by President Hoover and Vice-President Curtis.

Then to Oklahoma, his adopted state, he flew with his navigator for the home folks to have their say about the young man who made good in the air. It was here that the barefooted, freckled faced boy, who as a 32-year-old man carved high his niche in aviation's hall of fame, caught from the Wright brothers' experiments at Kitty Hawk the air urge that subsequently sent him shooting like a meteor through the skies. It was in this section that he flew his first owned plane an old Canuck. Here he often wing-walked his way while others at a most breathless stood with fixed gaze on his plane.

Home at last was Wiley Post, the youth who had a dream to "do something big in aviation" which developed into a zest to go around the world.

With his dream came an unflinching zeal which carried him in pursuit on this pot of gold on a rainbow trip.

He found this pot of gold. He may like to ride in an automobile. He may like to have a house with a big rainbow with gold even more glittering.

Friends say that Wiley is "built that way."

WOULD-BE DRIVERS TAKE EXAMINATION

Summer Session Clinic Aids Numerous Children

A school where educators come from all parts of the country to teach, and children from the first grade clear into high school come to have their difficulties straightened out, a school which has no formal discipline, but to which the children come early and stay late, and in which they sometimes progress as much as a whole grade in six weeks—such is the clinic held at the University of Oregon school of education summer session.

With an increase of nearly 50 per cent this year, the clinic has 115 pupils and 35 teachers from all over Oregon and many points out of state, while a great many children were turned away because only those who needed the most help could be taken due to limited facilities. The school is under the direction of Dr. B. W. DeBussk, University of Oregon; Dr. Grace Fernald, University of California at Los Angeles, assisted by Dr. Rachel Stutsman, psychologist of the Merrill-Palmer school of Detroit, and Lillian Rayner, of the Los Angeles public schools.

These children are normal in every way, except that they have special difficulties in reading, writing, or arithmetic, which with the right method are surprisingly easy to clear up. Working from the theory that if we can learn to learn, we can learn anything, it is just as probable that some learn by the kinesthetic means, the founders of the clinic have established a system which has brought scores of children from failing to leading in their classes.

Many times the situation is complicated by the fact that the child has developed an inferiority complex about his inability to learn. An individual instruction is provided, although this year it has sometimes been necessary to give two or three pupils to the same teachers. The method is very simple. The word is written in large handwriting on a piece of paper, and the child traces it until he can write it without help, at the same time pronouncing the word. Sometimes this must be repeated numerous times, sometimes only a few, but if the child is really of this "motor-minded" type, it always works.

For instance, a little boy brought to the clinic at its opening, June 22, was given this sentence to copy, "I like to ride in an automobile." He simply couldn't copy it. The best he could do was "I like automobile." After a few days of tracing these words, he could copy it so well that he brought it to the clinic, and the principal of his school, who had visited the clinic last year for one week. All known methods of teaching reading had been exhausted, and when the instructor saw this method, it was immediately used, with the result that four months later the children could all pass the standard reading test for the next grade above the one in which they were placed.

Study along this line has been done by Dr. Fernald and Dr. DeBussk for many years, though the clinic here is but four years old. Actual discovery of the method was somewhat accidental. One day about 15 years ago Dr. Fernald, in desperation, seized the hand of the little boy she had been trying for months to teach to read, and made him trace the word "land" several times. The next day this was the only word he knew, and she had him trace others, with the result that in five months he could read, and was sent back to school where he caught up with his grade and finished a perfectly normal, intelligent child.

Not all who attend the school are of grammar school age, however, as there are quite a number of high school students who have special difficulties, and they wait just as earnestly as the younger ones.

Some of the children who come to the clinic have learned with a most amazing speed. One boy of 15 came last year, having passed the sixth grade in his own school, a small one, merely by courtesy. He was so near in reading that he could out even the 12 planes coming under command of Major D. G. Legg are due to arrive at 2:45 o'clock Saturday afternoon and fly in formation over the city. They will put on an air show and from 3:30 until 6 o'clock Saturday afternoon will be open to public inspection and also from 10 until 12 o'clock Sunday morning, the squadron to leave at 1 o'clock Sunday afternoon.

Twenty-eight men are on the staff with the planes. The 12 ships include one Curtiss Condor bomber, largest plane in any air service, six 12 T. planes, one 62H plane, and four B. T. planes.
