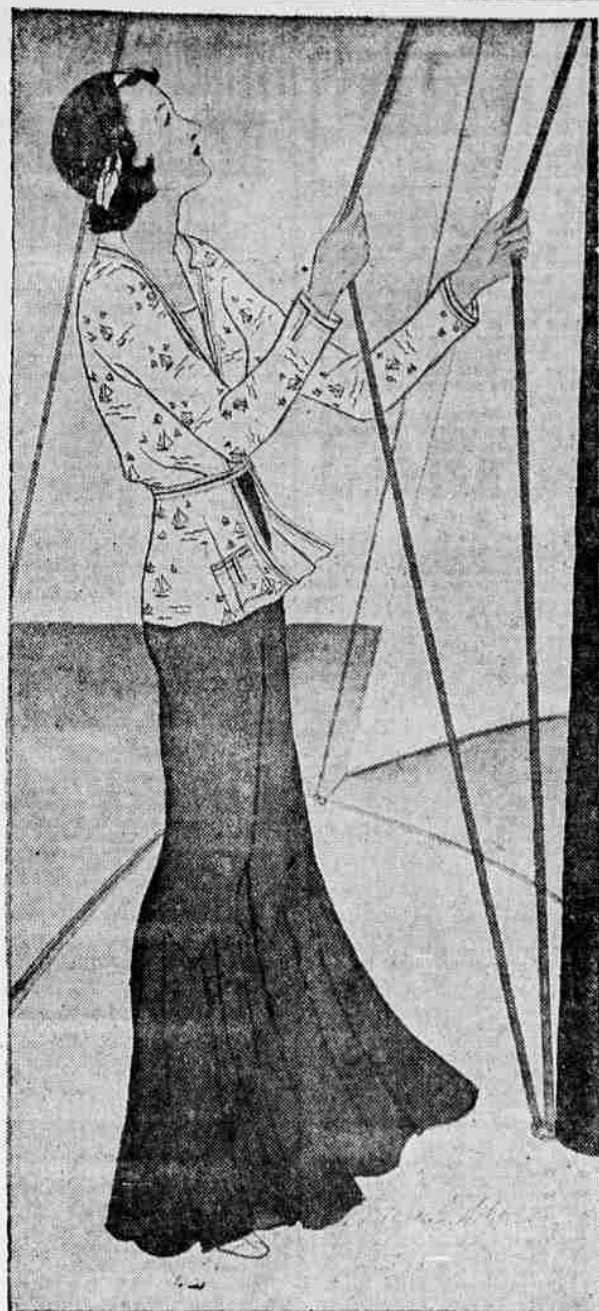

TODAY'S RECIPES

THE entire melon family is puzzling when you go to market to make a selection. There are many branches and they all have their particular characteristics, but it seems to me that watermelon is one of the most baffling.

Of course if you have a trained ear, the time-honored practice of thumping watermelon with your knuckles is a reliable test. A full grown, ripe melon has a dull muffled sound when thumped, while a green one rings with a metallic sharpness.

In other words, the ripe melon says "plunk" and the green ones say "plink."

If you can't rely on your ear in choosing watermelons there are other definite qualifications to watch for that will surely help you. The color and condition of the surface of the melon should be given special attention.

If the under-side is a pale yellow, lemon or a warm ivory color with the skin a sort of warty roughness, then ripeness is indicated. A warm, yellowish green rather than a bright clear green on the top is desirable. However, the variety of the melon influences the color to some extent.

Tomorrow's Menu
Breakfast: Rice, figs, cereal, cream, crisp broiled bacon, eggs, toast, milk, coffee.

Lunch: Jelly, tomato consommé, radishes and olive bread, shrimp and pea salad, rye bread, watermelon sherbet, sour cream cookies, milk, tea.

Dinner: Watermelon cocktail, grilled salmon steaks, broccoli in mock Hollandaise sauce, corn on the cob, Boston head lettuce with Roquefort dressing, gooseberry fool, milk, coffee.

Here's Another Test
There's a thin, film-like coating all over the surface of a watermelon that is worth noting. If the thumb nail is drawn across it, the coating will peel off like dry wax when the melon is ripe.

Although mis-shapen melons should be avoided, the natural shape of the fruit is of no importance, round or long melons being equally good. The color of the seeds also is a matter of the variety of the melon and has little to do with the maturity of the fruit.

Large melons usually are more desirable than small ones, but a small, heavy melon is preferable to a lightweight large one.

Over-ripe melons are as undesirable as immature ones. These can be detected by the dull appearance of the rind and the large number of yellow veins showing through the green surface.

Often part of a cut melon is purchased. Keep in mind that the flesh should be a deep pink or bright red well out to the rind, and that it should have a silver sheen. It also should be crisp and juicy.

Require Full Growth
Regardless of variety, all melons must have plenty of heat before they can reach maturity, so weather conditions are important.

tions throughout the country have much to do with the quality of the fruit. Melons are a fruit which must mature on the vines, and they must be ripe when cut for use. They may ripen after picking without greatly harming the flavor, but full growth must be allowed before harvesting.

Thoroughly chilled watermelon always is refreshing for summer meals. It is popular served as a natural, but there are innumerable ways of preparing it. As a cocktail with a non-alcoholic sherry dressing, in a salad, in a sherbet or a frappe, watermelon is cooling and inviting. Since it is made up chiefly of water, it is of little fuel value and adds a minimum of calories to one's diet.

YOUR CHILDREN

SOME statistics of the baby's early development may be interesting to new mothers. All babies are not alike, but if your small new son or daughter checks up with these figures it not only will be gratifying to discover that he is playing his part well, but rather excitedly to look ahead and see what may be expected of him in the next few months.

At 2 to 3 weeks of age, the eyes are held fixed on bright stationary objects.

At 3 to 4 weeks, the eyes are turned back and forth from one object to another.

At 4 to 5 weeks, they follow very slowly a moving object.

At 7 to 8 weeks, they are accommodated to distance.

In his 3rd or 4th week, it is evident that his mouth is his first organ of touch and exploration.

By the 7th week, he uses his lips and tongue.

At 7 to 8 weeks, he can hold up his head, but it is very weak and wobbly.

By the 10th or 11th week, his back is straightened so that he can look around when held upright.

At 10 or 12 weeks, he will try to sit up.

By the 22nd or 24th week, he usually can sit alone.

A baby 8 or 9 weeks old touches his hands together.

By the 16th or 17th week he voluntarily puts his hand to his mouth.

He begins to suck his thumb (or at least he puts his thumb in his mouth) by the 12th week. (Let us hope he does not continue to do so.)

At this time he also learns to explore an object with his hands, although the object is not looked at.

By the 16th or 17th week he develops reaching and grasping. Both hands are used alike. The movements are vague and uncertain.

At 20 weeks, he will hold objects in his hand to look at before putting looking at them.

His 20th week finds him picking up objects accurately with one hand and looking at them.

At 18 weeks, he begins to push hard with his feet.

From 12 weeks on this pushing develops into jumping, if he is supported with the feet touching the lap.

From 14 weeks on, rhythmic jumping (ever in response to music) begins.

The first six months is the time of development of "sense perception." From this time on, the co-ordination of eyes, hands, feet, legs and body advances rapidly.
