RENO, Nev., July 13.—(U.P.)—The biggest little city in the world, as Reno advertises itself, really isn't the dream place you imagined. It isn't a happy, glittering, romantic playground...

Reno's brightly-lighted gambling houses run day and night and liquor can be purchased at its bars the clock around and divorce comes easy...

which would necessitate printing emergency currency. Such currency, it was asserted, was not the same as the inflation money Germany had in 1923 when the printing presses tried to keep up with the decline of the mark.

Necessity for issuing emergency currency, it was emphasized, would arise from a variety of causes of small denomination, resulting from refusal of the Reichsbank to print money beyond its forty per cent gold coverage.

In the latest analysis Germany's one hope appears to be for help from the world bank.

CREDIT AID RUMORED LONDON, July 13.—(U.P.)—Reports were persistent in financial circles here today that a credit of 200,000,000 (about \$300,000,000) had been arranged for Germany by a combination of banks, including American and British. The reports could not be confirmed.

AMERICA SILENT NEW YORK, July 13.—(U.P.)—Reports in London that British and American bankers extended a \$300,000,000 loan to Germany could not be confirmed in Wall Street.

It is understood that American bankers have been prepared for several days to participate in such a credit pending satisfactory arrangements.

It was said at the federal reserve bank that the extending of credit rests with the developments at the world bank conference at Basel, that the problem was regarded as primarily a European matter, and that the federal reserve was taking no initiative in it.

REINFORCEMENT DENIED PARIS, July 13.—(U.P.)—Marshall Pétain and Lyautey, with other high ranking officers of the French army had luncheon today with Premier Laval at the ministry of war, and it was understood the conversation had to do with the situation in Germany.

No decision was taken, since a number of foreign military attaches were present, but Minister of War Maginot later issued a denial of a newspaper report that preparations had been made to reinforce the frontier guard.

HOOPER EYES CRISIS WASHINGTON, July 13.—(U.P.)—President Hoover turned his undivided attention today to the German financial situation.

Retiring from his Rapidan camp where he spent the week-end, the chief executive found important communications concerning Germany's plight on his desk and immediately began a study of them.

Additional information came to him from the state department, the treasury and press reports.

All available sources were used by the White House to keep in close contact with the situation, although it was said that the chief executive had not communicated directly with Ambassador Sackett nor with any other official in Germany.
