JOHNNY MORRELL, JOE GARDNER TO TANGLE IN PRELIM

Vern Clarke, hard boiled Olympian middleweight who likes his wrestling rough, will tangle with George "Wildcat" Pete here Friday night in the Eugene armory.

It will not be a title match, as Vern is a middleman who doesn't get down to junior weight and Pete will not train down to that weight. But the title match or not, it bids fair to be for the roughhouse championship of the world. Clarke was kicked out of his own town—as far as wrestling is concerned—because his wrestling was so rough. His suspension has been raised, and so he is again eligible to try his rough stuff.

Pete Ready "I'll be ready for that boy," said the Wildcat over telephone from Portland. "If he likes it rough, he'll get it that way. I'm going to be in good shape for that match."

Clarke's rough stuff is no idle boast. That suspension was no fluke. The man doesn't like to wrestle unless he can get tough. That's all there is in it for him.

This will be his first appearance in Eugene. Fans here will get a change—a look at a new face.

Joe Tails 'Em Joe Gardner, another Olympian, is coming here Friday to grapple with Johnny Morrell, our University boy. Joe says that Vern Clarke "can take Pete easily, any day," so he'll be something to look forward to.

Joe put on a plenty fast bout with Sammy Vangler here recently, and will have a lot of support in his match with Morrell. Their go should be a fast one. Morrell took Gardner into camp once before. That was last year. Joe wants to trun the tables this time.

Portland Ready To Uphold Reputation As Queen Golf City In Western Tournament

PORTLAND GOLF CLUB, Portland, Ore., July 13.—(AP)—It was the rest of the country against Portland today with the opening of the thirty-second annual amateur tournament of the Western Golf Association at the Portland Golf Club.

A divotting army of 60 of the country's leading golfers invaded this city to battle with 51 Portlanders for the Western Amateur championship held by Johnny Lehman of Chicago.

For many years Portland has contended that it is the "biggest golfing town in the world" and its mighty band of bibliocists were ready today to prove the assertion in this tournament.

Portland Stars in With Dr. O. F. Willing, Frank Dolp, Don Moe, Eddie Hogan, Rudie Wilhelm and Johnny Robbins in the front line ranks for this city such stars as Francis H. I. Brown of Honolulu, Clara Griswold and A. G. Sato of San Francisco, Ken Storey and Forest Watson of Spokane, Leslie Gordon of Chicago, Fay Coleman of Los Angeles, Jack Gaines and Harold Thompson of Glendale, H. Chandler Egan of Medford, Phil Findley of Redlands, Johnny Shields of Seattle, W. K. Yost of Tacoma and the defending champion, Lehman, had their hands full if they were to carry the crown out of Portland.

Lehman elected not to compete in the qualifying rounds today and tomorrow. This is a privilege granted the defending champion and he decided to take advantage of it figuring that it was too risky to take a chance in the medal test against such a strong field.

Qualifiers Off Play was to start at 9:30 a. m., with 18 holes scheduled for today and as many more for tomorrow in the qualifying race. Match play will start Wednesday with two 18-hole eliminations.

NEW YORK, July 13.—(AP)—Big Bill Tilden has proved himself king of the world's professional tennis players.

The tall Philadelphiaian who used to rule the amateurs, needed only 59 minutes to trounce Vincent Richards, defending champion, in the first round of the United States pro championship yesterday, 7-5, 6-2, 6-1. These two were the survivors of a field that included all of the leading American pros and Europe's two outstanding masters, Karel Kozeluh and Albert Burke.

The doubles went to Richards and Howard Kinsey of California who beat Tilden and Frank Hunter, 7-9, 7-5, 3-6, 6-4, 6-3.

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
