Local Pears Coming in; Stock Market Recovers

WHEAT QUOTED UP CENT HERE; OTHER MARKETS QUIET HERE

The local Bartlett pears are coming on the market this week. They are a big green but will soon ripen for use. They are quoted at \$1 a bushel, buying price.

Wheat is quoted a bit higher here, both the white and red being boosted a cent, the white to 47 cents and the red to 45 cents. Grains are coming in slowly. The harvest season is more than half over in this section but the farmers are not hauling in much yet because during the harvest time most farmers are busy helping each other out. However, some are holding their grain for better prices, it is said.

Eggs, poultry, livestock, butter and beef are all unchanged from Wednesday.

Beefsteak onions from local growers are beginning to come in, quoted at 4 and 5 cents a pound.

Corn continues very plentiful, listed still at 10 cents a dozen ears.

Summer squash is also very plentiful as are green peppers. Most all the local prices on vegetables held Thursday.

ONE POINT ADVANCE SHOWN BY NUMBER OF STRONG ISSUES

NEW YORK, Aug. 13.—(AP)—The stock market scored a moderate recovery today, finishing with general advances of about 2 points.

Firming of the oil shares on the signing of a conservation bill in Texas expected to cut the flood of oil from the great East Texas pool by about 20 per cent, started an advance which spread through most of the list, affecting merchandising food and miscellaneous issues notably. Ralls also recovered in spots, on ordering of the regular dividend by Union Pacific.

The advance faltered considerably during the afternoon, and final prices were generally somewhat under the day's best. The closing tone was firm, however, and sales were around a million and a half shares. Issues finishing a point or two higher included U. S. Steel, American Telephone, General Electric, General Motors, Standard of New Jersey and California, Texas Corp., Shell Union Preferred, General Foods, National Biscuit, International Telephone, Bohn Aluminum, Montgomery Ward and Sears Roebuck. Gains of 3 to 4 appeared in Union Pacific, Santa Fe, Westman, Case and General Railway Signal.

FEW CHANGES ARE NOTED ON MARKET

There were few changes at the Producers' Public market Thursday.

Some of the first Bartlett pears were in, selling at \$1.10 a box. Bermuda onions are also making their appearance, selling at 7 cents a pound, four pounds for 25 cents.

The first of the yellow pear tomatoes are on the market, selling at 5 cents a pound. Stall 48 has them.

These blue plums, so common in the market, are beginning to come in. Various kinds of plums and prunes both are on the market now. Many are a bit hard for eating but they are fine for cooking.

A few green pears are still noted on the market.

Green peppers are much more plentiful, unchanged in price at 8 cents a pound, two for 15 cents.

There continues a demand for dressed hen turkeys in the local trade with prices well held.

While there is an overabundance of white-meat salmon, real quality stuff is not plentiful. Halibut is fairly steady at 14c for medium and 11-12c for chicken. A few salmon are arriving and moving 10c with sea perch around 8-9c.

There continues an acute shortage of fresh crabs here and prices are reported firm to higher. Sales are reported at \$2.00-2.50 dozen for the medium and large respectively.

Acute shortage of native oysters is reported. A small supply from Willapa bay is the only arrival. This is quoted strong at \$3 a gallon.

Quite fair increase in the supply of Dillard cantaloupes is reported. Around 100 crates were received. Priced around \$2.25 for graded standard.

Onions again higher at Walla Walla. Look higher here for Friday.

Sweet potatoes are lower.

Old-fashioned muskmelons arriving from the Dillard section and are priced around 4c lb.

Pugot Sound blueberries — the well known blueberries, are arriving from Tacoma and priced to start at 10c.

Celery market continues firm.

Quality of local lettuce is again getting to the top notch. Market very firm.
