RULES ANNOUNCED FOR JUNCTION CITY 4-H FAIR, AUG. 22

The completed rules and premium list for the Junction City 4-H club fair to be held in the new fire hall at Junction City on Saturday, August 22, has been received from the office of the county club agent. The fair is being sponsored by the merchants and Lions club of Junction City.

Exhibits of home economics work, and crops will be housed in the fire hall. Livestock and poultry exhibits will be cared for in a barn across the street from the fire hall.

Exhibitors for the fair may be entered by all 4-H club members enrolled in the fair. Through the Junction City post-office or the mail routes out of Junction City. Completed records and exhibits must be presented with all exhibits. Ribbons will be awarded to exhibitors in all classes. Bronze medals will be given to the winners in each of the major divisions, such as canning, cooking, sewing and home economics.

All exhibits in home economics must be entered by noon of Friday. Livestock, poultry, and crop exhibits must be entered in a place by 10 o'clock on Saturday forenoon. R. C. Kuehner, county club agent, will be on hand Friday afternoon to give assistance in preparing livestock exhibits and in giving help in showmanship to those having their exhibits on the ground by 1 o'clock Friday. Feed and bedding for livestock must be furnished by the exhibitors.

Judging contests will be held in livestock, home economics and crops. Four 4-H summer school scholar ships will be given as prizes in the demonstration contest. Each demonstration team will consist of one or two scholars going to the winning boys team and two to the winning girls team. Demonstration contestants must supply their own materials. The demonstration will be held in cooking, sewing, canning, home making, miscellaneous, crops, poultry and livestock.

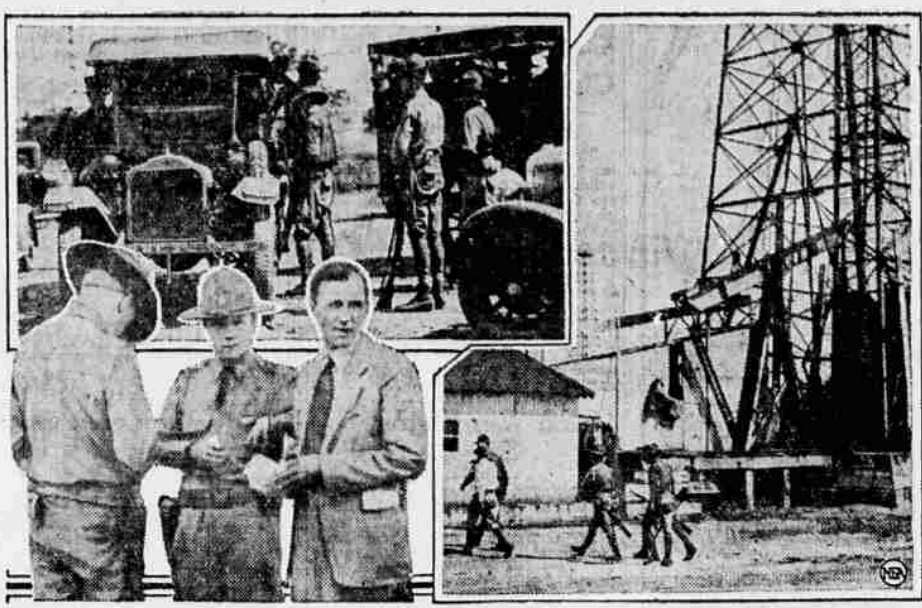
