TODAY'S RECIPES

PARTICULARLY at this season of the year, inexpensive and delicious meals are possible. The August appetite demands less hearty food and the market supplies vegetables and fruits at minimum prices.

A stuffed vegetable dinner provides an interesting meat flavor with little tax on the food allowance. It's surprising how many vegetables lend themselves to interesting concoctions with well-seasoned stuffings of meat or nuts combined with bread crumbs, macaroni or rice. Cabbage, eggplant, tomatoes, green peppers, cucumbers, summer squash, onions and potatoes are attractive and of increased nourishment when served with a stuffing.

The vegetable and meat casserole is another praiseworthy low-cost dish. The long slow cooking develops a rich, blended flavor that is decidedly appetizing. For August meals, use carrots, lima beans, corn, tomatoes—any combination you have at hand with meat as a seasoning. Use a bottled coloring to make it brown and season generously with kitchen herbs to give a pungent savoriness.

Economy in Desserts

The cost of the meal also can be kept down by planning desserts to add to the food value and round out the menu. Jelly desserts and cereal puddings of rice, cornstarch and tapioca blend well with the flavor of fresh fruits and frequently add milk and eggs to the day's ration.

A creamy rice pudding chilled to the "ith degree is appropriate for the hottest noon or evening meal, and, served with fresh or stewed fruit, rivals the most extravagant dishes. A soft custard perfectly made

and thoroughly chilled makes a nourishing sauce for fresh peaches or other fruit. Fruit juices stiffened with cornstarch and molded with small pieces of fruit make delicate individual puddings that are delectable served with plain cream and powdered sugar.

Chateaufort of lamb and rice is an example of an inviting vegetable dish with meat flavor. Served with a salad and suitable dessert, an inexpensive and nourishing meal is provided.

Chartreuse of Lamb and Rice

One pound lamb, 2 small onions, 6 small carrots, 1 sweet pepper, 2 cups shell peas, 1 tablespoon butter, 2 teaspoons salt, 1/2 teaspoon white pepper, 2 teaspoons flour, 2 1/2 teaspoons curry powder, 1/2 teaspoon liquid vegetable seasoning, 1/2 cup brown rice.

Cut meat in half inch cubes and saute quickly in hot drippings. Cover with 2 cups boiling water and simmer 45 minutes. Add vegetables and finish cooking. Melt butter and add flour and curry powder sifted together. Stir and cook until bubbly and add to meat and vegetables with seasonings. In the meantime, cook rice until tender and line a well-buttered baking dish. Fill with meat mixture and cover top with rice. Dot with bits of butter, cover baking dish and bake 20 minutes in a moderate oven. Unmold and serve.

This dish can be prepared, ready for the final baking in the morning, and kept in the ice box until wanted.

YOUR CHILDREN

I HAVE been so intensely interested in Dr. D. A. Thom's opinions and his excellent advice about children's eating that I must follow up some of his remarks I wrote to you yesterday, by a few more interesting facts today.

If you missed that, let me summarize for a moment. A child must be cheerful when he eats, not sulky or excited. He should not be coaxed or fussed over so that attention is sweet to him and he will let you repeat it. He should not hear his mother tell the neighbors "how Tommy will not eat." He will continue to keep in the limelight.

Don't Worry, Mother

Now we can go on with further news. Dr. Thom (by the way, a leading specialist in child behavior, if you have not happened to hear of him), says this:

"One of the most common mistakes the mother makes is brought about by her preconceived notions that every child requires the same amount of food and that every child must necessarily eat every meal. With this idea in mind she becomes fretful and emotionally upset if the child fails to meet her standards. Notwithstanding the fact that the state of nutrition is one of the most important indicators of the child's well-being, it does not hold true that all children require the same amount of food and that they must necessarily be of the same height or weight at a certain age, or that any particular harm will follow if they miss a meal or two. It is frequently this undue anxiety on the part of the parent that tends to make the meal hour an event rather than an incident in the child's daily life.

Don't Arouse Antagonism

"If, for some reason the child cannot, or will not, eat the meal before him, do not force him or talk the matter over before him. There is grave danger of arousing an antagonistic attitude toward a particular type
