

## 3 LANE STUDENTS ARE CANDIDATES FOR SCHOLARSHIP

Winning an opportunity to compete in the state and then at the district examination, four University of Oregon students, three from Lane county and one from Portland, were chosen by the university foreign scholarship committee as candidates for the Rhodes scholarship, three years' study at Oxford University in England.

Wallace Campbell, Eugene; George Harrington, Eugene; Frank Lombard, Springfield; and Dave Williams, Portland, were those chosen by the committee to represent the university at the state examination in Portland on Dec. 6.

At Portland two candidates will be selected to represent the state at the district examination to be held at Seattle at a later date. Six states, Washington, Oregon, Montana, Idaho, North Dakota, and Nevada, are included in the northwest district.

The Rhodes scholarship is among the most coveted of awards given to American universities. It amounts to \$3,000 a year, made possible through money left by Cecil Rhodes, an Englishman who made an enormous fortune in Africa at the time when that continent was being opened up as an economic factor in the world.

The faculty committee making the selection is composed of: Dean George Reber, Professor Ernest Gilmore, Professor Andrew Fish, Professor S. Stephenson Smith, and Mrs. George Fitch, secretary. Professor Smith is secretary of the state examining body.

## DR. SPEARS WRITTEN UP FOR M. E. PAPER

Born in every Methodist Episcopal church Sunday school in the United States, read an interesting article about Dr. Clarence W. Spears, University of Oregon football coach. "What Makes a Football Player?" is the subject of the article as told by Dr. Spears to the Boardman. The article appears in "The Target," magazine for intermediate boys in the M. E. Sunday school.

"Coach Clarence W. Spears, football mentor at the University of Oregon, is one of America's leading college coaches. This former All-American Dartmouth guard, selected by Walter Camp, is not only a developer of champion teams, but he is an instructor who puts a deep personality stamp upon his players. Leading educators know that a coach makes almost as much of an impression on the players as the professors," the writer-up begins.

"Doctor Spears, who is a practicing physician, not only knows football strategy thoroughly, but has an exceptional record for taking new players with little or no experience, and putting their names in the All-Western and All-American football Hall of Fame records," the story continues.

A sketch of Dr. Spears' life is given and several quotations from him on what goes into the makeup of a football player. "My point is this—the ideal player should have brains, speed, good physique, and coordination," the coach is quoted as saying.

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## Bishop Cannon Has no Hope of Completely Dry U. S.; Favors Dry Demo

BALTIMORE, Md., Oct. 13.—(AP)—Bishop James Cannon Jr., has little hope of making the country really dry in the sense that it will be impossible to get a drink, he told H. L. Mencken in a copyrighted article published today in the Evening Sun. The head of the Southern Methodist prohibition forces also told Mencken he would rather support a dry democrat than President Hoover. However, he gave Mr. Hoover credit for turning the tide in favor of prohibition.

"The president's message to congress when he sent in the Wickersham report," he told the noted critic, "turned the tide. When Mr. Hoover gave out that message he sent a thrill through the dries. The wavering dries now saw that there had a true friend in the White House, and they bucked up at once. Today they are full of steam."

Referring to the 1932 campaign and the man the prohibition forces would support, Cannon said, according to the article:

"My hope is that the democrats will nominate a dry next year. I don't ask them to adopt a dry platform. In fact, I have always been against it. I don't want prohibition to become a party issue. All I ask for is a declaration for law enforcement. . . . Then prohibition will drop out as an issue, and the campaign can be fought on some other ground—say the record of the Hoover administration. If this comes to pass I'll vote for the dry democrat and support Hoover."

Cannon predicted, however, that should the democrats name an anti-prohibitionist, Mr. Hoover would be re-elected.

"What of Franklin D. Roosevelt?" asked Mencken.

"His grace," the article continued, "made a gesture very unlike the sign of the cross."

"Roosevelt," he said, "was a dry in 1928 \* \* \* now he is wet. Tomorrow he may begin to go dry again. Let the wets take him. We dries don't trust him."

Speaking of enforcement, according to Mencken, Cannon said:

"I suppose we must give up such places as New York and Baltimore. When I speak of the United States I exclude them. . . . The main thing is that we have made drinking unlawful and immoral. If people want to keep on doing it, that is their own lookout. They know that it is against the law, and must take their chances. . . . If a man really wants to drink he will always be able to do it—at least in Baltimore and New York."

## REPUBLICANS TO ORGANIZE SENATE UNDER NEW SETUP

WASHINGTON, Oct. 13.—(AP)—Republicans almost surely will organize the new senate, but there is a lot of private bickering about it at the capitol.

Barring deaths before December 7 the lineup is expected to be 48 republicans, 47 democrats and one farmer-labor.

Because of this close division it is possible, of course, for one or two republicans to throw the organization to the democrats by simply not voting.

Some republican regulars who recall the coalition last session of the democrats and republican independents intimate they would be just as willing that the democrats assume responsibility for the next senate.

If they give control to the democrats these regulars would see Senators Borah, Idaho, Norris, Nebraska, two of the leaders of the coalition, lose their chairmanships of the important foreign relations and judiciary committees, respectively.

There are counter threats from the independent group, although neither Senator Borah nor Senator Norris seems interested. Some of this faction intimate they will seek to elect Senator Moses of New Hampshire as president pro tem. Senator Moses is ready to meet this by a retaliatory vote to elect from their chairmanships any republicans who desert him.

## EUGENE INSPECTOR WINS FIRST PRIZE

Robert W. Rundlett, city building inspector of Eugene won a lumber grading contest at the annual Pacific Coast Building Officers' conference at Berkeley, Cal., held Oct. 5 to 10. Mr. Rundlett accompanied by Mrs. Rundlett, arrived home Monday.

The prize won by Mr. Rundlett was a pair of candlesticks made from lumber taken from the White House at Washington, D. C., when the building was remodeled in 1827. The lumber was used to support the roof of the building and had been in use for 112 years, having been placed in the building during the administration of President James Madison. Mr. Rundlett had the choice of several prizes and chose these candlesticks for their historic value.

Seventy-five or 80 building inspectors attended the conference, the one from the farthest distance, being from Vancouver, B. C. There was another one from Salt Lake City. The next convention will be held at Vancouver.
