

YMCA VALUABLE AS CHARACTER BUILDER SAYS LOCAL DOCTOR

The annual canvass for funds for the maintenance of the City and University Young Men's Christian association is about to begin. Many will be asking questions as to why such a canvass should be necessary.

The Young Men's Christian association is an old organization. Its origin as a character builder is un- questioned. Its influence is felt in every land on the globe. When in 1851 I visited the International Y. M. C. A. office at Geneva, I was gratified to learn that a very large number of the leading men of the League of Nations were the supporters of the Young Men's Christian association and as- sured me that its program in their own countries. Probably in no coun- try has the influence of the Y. M. C. A. been so valuable in holding to- gether a disintegrating nation as in China.

We are most interested, however, in the local situation. Through faith in the local situation, Eugene citizens are built and maintained a Y. M. C. A. building. This building makes it possible to carry on educational and recre- ative activities. Three-hundred-odd children days in the year—neither day, week or month interferes with these activities. Swimming, gymnas- tic games and study classes are estab- lished in the building. The third floor is used for dormitories. Here a man of limited means may get a bed and room at a minimum price. Young men looking for jobs, or temporarily out of work, are made to feel at home. Here also, many a deserving man gets a night's lodging without cost.

In the second floor are assembly rooms, which are used by study classes and for lectures, entertainments and public gatherings. The public should use these rooms more often than it does.

The Y. M. C. A. building provides facilities for swimming, classes for boys, younger and older, also for women and girls; volleyball tournaments, basketball tournaments, handball, ar- chery, tennis, etc. Many other activities are carried on in this build- ing to interest and instruct the boys from ten years of age up. Character building is the whole aim and object of these activities and many a home- less Eugene is grateful for the services rendered.

Trained leadership is essential for the successful management of this es- tablishment. Yet the cost per year is less than 15 per cent of the capital in- vestment. I wonder if many business houses in Eugene are run with as small an overhead.
