

HARTLEY STARTS GOVERNOR RACE FOR THIRD TIME

OLYMPIA, Wash., Nov. 13.—(U.P.)—Hartley for governor!

The campaign cry will again ring from administration forces.

Governor Roland H. Hartley will attempt to win office for a third time, as indicated here today.

To most political observers, the governor's long-promised tax statement, which he released today, was proof of his intentions.

It was a summary in defense of ten years of administration and in praise of the executive's "retrenchment and economy" policies.

The 1,000 word statement had the effect of a 1932 campaign pledge.

The governor pointed out that his present policy "had been followed for seven years," and added, "it will be followed as long as I remain in office."

Providing today's statement and as subsequent statements can be seen on their apparent face value, Governor Hartley will be the first to go to a third term.

He often has said he never considered his "work finished" and he believes the large political following which he has built up in seven years, will aid him over the greatest barriers ever confronted in his many candidacies.

A few days ago the executive again published his favorite pastime of publishing, which he has neglected for months. This time he chose Howard Findley of King county and said him over the object for his senior courts as the object for his term.

Justice Findley was scored for declining to make an administration official receiver for the defunct Puget Sound Savings and Loan association.

Arrests Promised For Erring Drivers
