

### BUILDERS' CHAPTER IS PLANNED HERE

Plans are being made to form a local chapter of the Oregon Building Congress and O. H. Hughson of Portland has been here for a number of days to interest the citizens in the movement.

At a meeting at the chamber of commerce Friday night Mr. Hughson outlined the plans of the organization before several men, including builders, representatives of hardware and building material dealers, electrical goods stores, insurance and bond houses and other lines interested. At another meeting will be called for some time next week.

One of the main objects of the builders' congress is to encourage building activities at all times, especially now, when there is much idle labor, and another is the proper inspection of buildings under construction to insure the safety of the occupants.

Mr. Hughson pointed out that the funds set aside by cities, county courts and other groups for emergency unemployment relief gave work principally to common labor on roads and highways and there is no provision made for skilled labor.

Mr. Hughson will be here for a number of days and is to be found at the Osburn hotel by anyone interested.

peace between China and Japan if other methods fail.

#### ARMISTICE POSSIBLE

TOKIO, Nov. 21.—(AP)—It appeared possible today that the Japanese government might be willing to accept an armistice in Manchuria if it were conditional on the cessation of anti-Japanese activities in China as well as armed action in Manchuria.

#### PLAN PROPOSED

PARIS, Nov. 21.—(AP)—Kenkichi Yoshizawa, Japanese delegate to the council of the league of nations, formally proposed at a public meeting of the council this afternoon that the league send a commission to determine the facts regarding the military situation in Manchuria.

This commission, the Japanese representative declared, should carry on its investigation throughout China. He criticized China for her "unilateral denunciation of treaties" and accused the Nanking government of other aggravating acts.

What the Japanese want in Manchuria, the little bespectacled delegate said, is their rights.

The work of the investigating commission, the Japanese spokesman explained, "should in no way modify Japan's wish to withdraw her troops as soon as security conditions warrant."

M. Yoshizawa addressed the council after Aristide Briand, the chairman, had warned him and Dr. Alfred Sze, Chinese spokesman, to confine themselves to restrained speech in order that they might not aggravate the situation.

Council Confused Because of yesterday's premature announcement that an armistice had been agreed to, the atmosphere in which the council met was considerably confused.

Dr. Sze, who followed the Japanese delegate to the rostrum, declared Japan's occupation of Manchuria was in violation of the covenant and of the Briand-Kellogg pact. China, he said, can accept no proposition which does not provide some arrangement for evacuation at a reasonable early date.

He declared his readiness to accept the league's supervision to see that China's measures of security were effectively carried out.

Schwartz heaved a long pass to Jackwhich who was run out of bounds on California's 16-yard. Schwartz picked up a yard, Brancheau gained 9 and then Schwartz made a first down on California's 4 yard. Schwartz lost a yard, then Bama swept to the one yard with a minute and a half to go. Bama plowed through center for a touchdown. With Schwartz holding the ball, Jackwhich kicked goal from a placement, making the score Notre Dame 7, Southern California 0.

Griffith went in the Trojan backfield, Jackwhich kicked off, the ball going over the Southern California goal line. It was put in play on the 20 yard. The Trojans filled the air with passes. Jackwhich grabbed one, on his 42 yard and ran to Southern California's 14 yard line as the period ended.

Score: Southern California 0, Notre Dame 7.

### Third Period

Notre Dame started the third period with the same team that finished the first half. Jackwhich kicked off to Musick, who returned to the Trojans' 25 yard. Schwartz swept right end for 15, going to California's 39 yard. Schwartz shot a lateral pass to Bama, who zipped away on a gain of 39, to California's 3 yard. Running and twisting, he was first knocked down on the 10 yard, then got up and started off again with Pinckert stopping him. Schwartz plunked through right tackle for a touchdown. Jackwhich kicked goal from placement with Schwartz holding the ball. Score: Southern California 0; Notre Dame 14.

Jackwhich kicked off to Pinckert who brought it back to his 25 yard. Notre Dame was penalized five for offsides, giving the Trojans first down on their own 40 yard line. Musick, injured, was replaced by Mohler at quarterback, with Shaver going to fullback. Mohler made a first down on the 37 yard. Spurling and Mohler made a first down on their own 47 yard. Kosky reduced host at left end for Notre Dame. Wunsch replaced Hoffman at right guard for Notre Dame. Mohler smashed right tackle for first down on Notre Dame's 40 yard line. Shaver hit right guard for five and then broke through for 5 more and another first down. The ball was on Notre Dame's 29 yard.

Clark replaced Mallory at left half for California. As the period ended, Mohler carried the ball to Notre Dame's 14 yard lacking less than a foot for first down. Score: S. C. 0; Notre Dame 14.

### Fourth Period
