 mittee of the Lane County Agricul-
 tural council in Eugene Saturday
 afternoon at 10 a. m. to plan the
 work of Stanley G. Jewett, in
 charge of federal predatory animal
 control in Oregon, was here
 conferring with C. S. Fletcher,
 county agent, regarding the meeting
 and obtaining a summary of his
 work in rodent control here during
 the past year. He was accompanied
 by Chester Hight, predatory animal
 hunter, and Mr. Eugene, chairman
 of the rodent control committee of
 the biological survey.

Chamber Sends Telegram—
 A telegram of greetings and best
 wishes to former Oregonians in
 Washington, D. C., to be read at the
 first meeting of the Oregon society
 of that city was sent by State Agri-
 cultural commissioner Friday. Let-
 ters from E. J. Adams, member of
 the federal trade commission and
 the Oregonian, state that the din-
 ner scheduled to be held in the Ken-
 nel Warren hotel Saturday evening
 was being advertised and sev-
 eral hundred former Oregonians were
 expected to attend. Over 200 pounds
