Give Two Reasons

Constitutionality of High School Fund Law Attacked
LARGE LOSS IS CITED
"Big Four" Declares Money Insufficient For Teaching Cost

WASHINGTON, Dec. 21.—(AP)—Senate leaders of both parties agreed to hold hearings today at a White House conference of prompt action on the \$500,000,000 reconstruction corporation after the Christmas holidays.

Violations Charged
