Brain Of Man Employs Sugar For Its Work
NEW ORLEANS, Jan. 1.—(AP)—A man's brain, busy thinking, uses more sugar than one of his arms or legs, the American Association for the Advancement of Science was told today.

Blood, on its trips through the head, drops much of its sugar in the brain, reported Dr. Abraham Myerson of Boston. Brains of people who are conscious absorb twice as much sugar as when the people are unconscious under ether, he said. His discovery is a new aid to study of mental and nervous troubles.

The brain absorbed much sugar from the blood in almost every one of the 300 persons whom he tested, Dr. Myerson found. Just how the brain uses the sugar, whether the sugar is actual "food for thought" is not yet certain. He tested the blood as it moved into the brain through an artery, and again as it left the brain through the jugular vein, before it could mix with blood from the rest of the body. Some of the excess of sugar in the body in cases of diabetes seems to be stored in the brain, Dr. Myerson discovered. Describing blood tests of a patient with diabetes, he said:

"The amount of sugar stored in the brain in this case was far in excess of that of any case that we had, indicating that in a diabetic, sugar is stored in the brain or at least disappears from the blood in excessive amounts. During either the amount stored or disappearing in the brain was greatly reduced."

Screens Installed For Gravel Plant
The Lane Sand and Gravel company is installing their last screens preparatory to getting out the gravel for the city filtration plant, according to C. M. Igou, manager of the plant.

Mr. Igou stated that the firm was about ready to complete its articles of incorporation. The firm is to be incorporated at \$25,000 in preferred stock to be paid in as soon as the charter is issued. All of the stock is said to have been subscribed by local people, leaving none for sale.
