NEW LANE ARRIVALS PUT IMPROVEMENTS ON THEIR FARMS

home Monday, Jan. 5.—Mr. Watrous was born in Brandt Center, N. Y., Oct. 17, 1851. He grew to manhood there with his chickens most of the life, retiring about 1910. He married Iva Marie Robin in Buffalo, N. Y., Nov. 6, 1879.

He leaves his widow, one daughter, Mrs. Thomas Nelson, of Junction City; three sons, John of Portland, Merle of Medford, and George of Junction City. There are also, four grandchildren and one sister and two brothers in New York state.

Mr. Watrous has not been very well for some time but was busy about his yard with his chickens most of the time. Saturday he was taken with a heart attack and died suddenly.

Funeral services were held from Miller's chapel Wednesday at 10 a. m., Rev. W. B. Empey officiating, and the remains were taken to the Portland Crematorium for the last rites, with Miller's funeral home in charge of arrangements.

Extensive improvements by new settlers in this section on farms bought in recent months are being made, according to reports made to the chamber of commerce by the new families. One of the largest investments is being made by Wheeler and Hawkins who bought the 300-acre Harry Lockwood ranch on the Willamette highway about 10 miles from Eugene.

They have completely modernized the house on this place, brought electricity to the farm and installed a new water system. They have erected a guest house and office and will soon work on a new house for a caretaker. A new garage, dairy barn and hog houses will be started soon. A number of purebred Jersey cows and some Chester White pigs have been purchased and turkeys and sheep will be added soon and the entire place stocked to capacity when barns are completed. The new owners have named the place the "Willamette River Ranch." They expect to make it one of the outstanding show places of the county. Both of these men came to Lane county from Santa Barbara, Cal.

F. E. Rice, formerly of Ontario, Cal., has reported to the chamber of commerce that he was starting the erection of a set of complete buildings on the 150-acre farm located five miles north of Eugene and formerly owned by T. J. Ryan. Mr. Rice was a builder for many years in California and will supervise the erection of a new home and dairy and poultry barns and get a part of his acreage into crop this spring. He plans to subdivide his acreage and erect a set of buildings on smaller tracts.

The Mountain States Power company officials recently told E. G. Harlan, manager of the chamber of commerce, they were bringing their lines to four new families brought here through the chamber's efforts. Industries continue to come to the chamber office from families in all parts of the country, averaging 15 per day. Drought conditions in Montana and western North and South Dakota have resulted in a flood of inquiries from these sections, and many families have written that they are coming to this county within the next 60 days. One letter came from a man in the oil business at Oruba, Danish West Indies, who plans to retire in some Willamette valley city having a university where he can educate his two daughters.
