IS SENT TO JAIL

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Dick McDaniel, a Spokane youth 19 years old, was fined \$50 in Police Judge Bryson's court Thursday on a charge of registering at a hotel under a false name. He said he had no money with which to pay the fine and was committed to the city jail.

McDaniel, who has used a number of other names, came to Eugene in November and began to solicit subscriptions to a woman's magazine, selling member-

ships in a "reading club." According to the police, he registered at a number of hotels, each time under a separate name. At several levels of the police hierarchy, though, a part payment was made at some of them.

McDaniels was arrested Wednesday afternoon by William Haviland, city traffic officer, after a complaint had been sworn to in Judge Bryson's court. Chief Hall telegraphed to the northwest agency of the magazine at Seattle to inquire as to the South's connection with any of the agency's publications.

HONOLULU, T. H., Jan. 7.—Widespread repercussions from today from the territorial law suit to prevent further race riots were broke out after attacks on American women.

Another shooting, the dismissal of police officers, charges of murder and a life term for the latest attack, served to increase public uneasiness rapidly approaching a breaking point.

Patrolman James Polipala, shot and killed Miguel Polipala, a Filipino seaman attached to army transport Meigs, was dismissed from the police force and charged with murder. Polipala claimed Barabas had refused to submit to questioning.

In the second shooting, Manuel Hayashi, 19, a Japanese, was seriously wounded in the lung by the Thomas Gray of the coast guard.

The officer said his assailant was a prowler and that Hayashi was running from their capture.

Japanese told officers he was a fishing trip.
