YOUR CHILDREN

A MOTHER is worried because a neighbor has suddenly decided not to allow her little girl to play with this lady's small son.

"What am I to do?" asks this mother. "Robert is a little gentleman and he cannot understand why Ruth won't play with him any more. Ruth has gone off with a new girl just moved here and although the three played together beautifully for a week or two, now Robert has lost his old friend and he is heartbroken. We two mothers supervised their play and everything was fine—I know there was no complaint to be made in any way. I have an idea that the new girl's mother objects to boys in general from something she said. Is it all right for boys and girls to play together?"

I told her that it certainly was. In fact they should. There has been much talk on the question but it is now unanimously agreed that boys and girls should play together. There should be no sex line.

In the first place, to deliberately separate them, particularly if there are mysterious remarks accompanying the interference, only makes them conscious of something that should not be there.

Children, until they are approaching adolescence, have little or no sex consciousness. They like the same things, have largely the same instincts and tastes and think only of each other as pals.

Group Interests Important
If they are guided toward interesting activities, play games together, are read to together, have parties together, and particularly are encouraged to group interests, the friendships of boys and girls are necessary to the full rounding out of life.

From boys, girls learn to be less emotional, they learn to be good losers, think less of their own feelings and develop an interest in things outside themselves.

From girls, boys learn consideration, sympathy, gentleness and alertness.

I think it is wise to guide the activities of such groups and to fill their minds with a wholesome respect for each other. Certain frank and satisfying talks with them will govern the natural curiosity of the growing child. Street talk should be discarded by our own sense in informing them of as many fundamental facts as it is necessary for them to know. This is an important point—the age of the child should determine the nature of our conversation.

Parents can do harm by over-emphasizing the question of difference. Let them accept difference as a natural thing. Open frank friendship does not think of it.

The girl or boy who has always played with mixed friends will have right attitude when he or she reaches maturity. To be truthful, there is often great harm done by coupling girls up with girls and boys with boys, then when they are eighteen or twenty suddenly unlocking the doors.

TODAY'S RECIPES

If you serve canned vegetables day after day, either buttered or creamed, you will find that they soon lose their appeal. While these are excellent ways to serve them, an occasional innovation will make them be appreciated more fully. Made vegetable dishes are delicious and nourishing for winter days.

In serving made dishes keep in mind that the "makings" increase the food value but decrease the digestibility. The combination of ingredients is more slowly digested than the same ingredients served simply.

Because of their "makings," such mixtures are excellent for main lunch or dinner dishes or with a light meat course for dinner. For example, corn soufflé with pork chops brings up the protein content of the meal to the required allotment.

As a garnish, corn and pimiento timbales are most inviting with planked hamburger steak.

Corn fritters are a pleasing "stretch" for either luncheon or dinner when the menu of the house brings a guest at the last minute. Corn croquettes make an appetizing and novel addition to the planned company dinner. They can be made early in the morning and shaped ready for frying when wanted.

Corn Fritters
One cup canned corn, 1 egg, 1 1/2 cups flour, 3 teaspoons baking powder, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 cup milk. 1 tablespoon butter.

The amount of liquid on the corn determines the amount of milk required. Beat egg until light and add to corn. Mix and sift flour, salt and baking powder and stir into mixture. Melted butter, and enough milk to make a stiff drop batter. Drop from tip of spoon into deep hot fat. The fat thermometer should register 350 degrees F. Fry until a golden brown and drain on brown paper.

Gorn Soufflé
One can corn, 4 eggs, 1 tablespoon flour, 1 tablespoon butter, 1 teaspoon sugar, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1-2 teaspoon white pepper.

Mix flour, sugar and salt and stir into corn. Add butter and yolks of eggs, beaten until thick and lemon colored. Fold in the whites of eggs beaten until stiff and dry and turn into a well buttered baking dish. Bake

Oriental Beans
One can cut green beans, 1 small onion, 1 cup canned tomatoes, 1 tablespoon olive oil, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon sugar, 1-2 teaspoon pepper. Mince onion and cook until a pale straw color in olive oil. Add beans drained from the liquid in the can. Add tomatoes, sugar, salt and pepper and cook twenty minutes. Serve very hot.
