Timber Sales in Siuslaw Reported
Total value of timber sales in the Siuslaw national forest during 1931 was \$1,370.91, according to figures announced at the office of E. S. Shelley, supervisor of the forest, Friday.
The sales included 500 cords of wood, 550 posts, some cedar timber and some second growth fir timber. The cedar was used in a small sawmill in the Mapleton district and the second-growth fir was sawed at a small mill in Lincoln county.
The report shows that the total board feet of timber sold amounted to 988,930.
