

COUNTY ROADS ARE IN GOOD CONDITION SAYS ROAD OFFICIAL

Lane county roads are in excellent shape this winter and so far have not been damaged by floods, Ed Tullar, superintendent of road construction, reported Tuesday, following inspection trips over the county.

Mr. Tullar returned Tuesday from a trip over the roads in districts 11 and 21, east of Creswell, where he found good progress made in maintenance work under Tom Parks, road patrolman there. He also inspected roads west of Creswell and found them in good shape.

Two new cedar culverts will be sent out to the Cloverdale road Wednesday to be installed to care for surplus water.

Considerable water is standing in the flats in the district around Franklin, caused by overflows from the Corvallis creek and Long Tom river, Mr. Tullar reported. So far the water has not injured the roads in this region and in all probability will not unless there is considerably more high water, he reported.

The new grade east of Franklin was found in good shape. The grade south of Alvarado and the Centrak grade were both inspected by Tullar this week and found to be in good shape.

County road work is being hampered by continual rains, but men go to work whenever possible.

Maharani Nancy Miller Rather Reticent About Life in Purdah

NEW YORK, Jan. 20.—(AP)—Maharani Sharmisthabai, an American girl, who as Miss Nancy Miller four years ago married an Indian prince, returned to the United States today "very happy" in her Hindu marriage and professing to know little about her husband's homeland.

"We've been in India only twice since we were married," she explained. "We have spent most of our time at St. Germain, near Paris. That is our home."

The Maharani is the mother of two little princesses—Sharda Raju, aged 3, and Rita Raju, a little more than a year old.

"We are very happy with what we have," she said, smilingly denying a rumor that the fact both the children are girls had caused a rift between herself and her husband.

"It makes no difference to him at all. He has several sons. His eldest son, by a former marriage, is on the throne of Indore now, you know."

She stopped here but a few hours after her arrival before catching the first available train for her former home in Seattle, where she will visit briefly with her grandfather, Louis Schaeffer. She is in mourning for her grandmother, who died in Seattle last October.

Her highness was reticent in an interview she gave aboard ship. Both she and her secretary were worried lest her giving an interview and posing for pictures might be thought in bad taste.

"How did anyone find out I was aboard the ship?" she inquired. She was not listed among the passengers.

The former Nancy Miller, whose husband, the former Maharajah of Indore has a private fortune estimated at \$300,000,000 had a tiny crimson caste mark tattooed on her forehead before her marriage.

She was given the name Sharmisthabai, which she says cannot be translated into English—and which people usually misspell. Her husband's family name is Holkar.

The Maharajah, because of a scandal involving the murder of the husband of one of the match girls of his court abdicated several years ago in favor of his eldest son. He is now in Cairo, his American wife said, with their two little girls.

The Maharani is traveling with a retinue consisting of a French woman companion, Mlle. Cristiane Dupont, an Indian secretary, R. Khosli, and several native servants. Fellow passengers said the party kept very much to themselves on the trip from Naples on the Italian steamship Conte Biancamano. The Maharani ate her meals with her secretary and companion at a small table at one side of the dining salon.

She is taking a gift to her grandfather, a handsome tri-colored collie, named "Carlson." She played her departure from Naples until it arrived from her husband's estate at St. Germain, near Paris.

Out of respect to her late grandmother, she was dressed in black—a black silk gown, black cloth coat trimmed with astrakhan fur, and a close fitting black hat. She will be in this country, she said, only about two weeks.

He suggested that Secretary of State Stimson request Chilean Ambassador Miguel Cruzado to furnish information dealing largely with the operations of the Comanch nitrate combine.

Lieutenant Thomas Massie and two enlisted men, along with Mrs. Granville Fortescue, are held in the custody of an alleged attacker of Mrs. Massie.

2 Cases Heard in Skipworth's Court

The case of Esther K. Heron vs. James L. Heron, in which the defendant sought a reduction of support money paid Esther Heron, was heard in circuit court Tuesday. The defendant won a reduction from \$40 to \$25.

Sewing Instructor Appointed at E. H. S.

The appointment of Helen Lynn Jackson of Eugene as sewing instructor at Eugene high school was announced Wednesday by H. R. Gould, superintendent of schools.

The new teacher has been in the Liberty, Mont., schools this year, and has taught at Riverport, Ore. Her home is in Eugene. She will take her position Monday.

WORK PROGRESSING ON COAST HIGHWAYS

Slashing work is completed on the North Beach road in western Lane county, it was reported Wednesday by P. M. Morse, county engineer, who returned from a tour of inspection in the coast region. Arrangements were made to start grubbing and grading as soon as weather permits.

This road is a stretch of approximately 1500 feet from the Oregon coast highway to West Lake.

Mr. Morse also looked over the route for the road into North Beach. Clearing will be started as soon as possible, he said. A half mile of slashing on the road leading to Mercer lake has been completed and grubbing and grading will be started when the weather permits.

Mr. Morse was in the coast country for two days. He reports considerable snow lying in the mountain areas between here and the coast. Since it is going out slowly, he believes there is little danger of flood.

President Against Widow's Allowance

WASHINGTON, Jan. 20.—(AP)—Frank P. Hines, veterans' administrator, today told the house veterans' committee the bill before it to provide allowance for widows and orphans of veterans was "not in accord with the president's financial policy."

Hines said he had no formal report from the budget bureau, but felt sure the attitude there would be the same.

Most of the widows were comparatively young, he said, and their cases might wait until another session.

Another Attempt To Release Boloff

PORTLAND, Jan. 19.—(AP)—Another attempt to obtain the release from jail of Ben Boloff, convicted communist, was made here today. His attorney filed in circuit court a motion seeking Boloff's immediate release on his own recognizance.

Boloff has been confined in the county jail. He is under sentence to 10 years in prison. His conviction was upheld by the supreme court and recently a petition for rehearing was denied. A second petition for rehearing is pending.

Cookstove, Brooms And Clocks Needed

A cook stove, two alarm clocks and many brooms are needed by the Red Cross office for distribution, it was announced Tuesday.

Several families have reported they have no brooms and the Red Cross urges anyone having any of these articles to spare to get in touch with the office here.

Coolidge Says It's Lack of Judgment

NEW YORK, Jan. 20.—(AP)—Calvin Coolidge says "a general lack of judgment contributed to the present economic situation." Writing in the American magazine, the former president discusses conditions, praises the national banking system and denounces hoarders.

"It is impossible to point out any general moral lapse, any widespread

dishonesty," he says in treating the causes of the slump. "The most we can say is that there has been a general lack of judgment so serious as to involve practically the whole country."

Motion pictures were provided by the Carl Baker Kodak shop; Marion Gerhardt, musician, gave a few from a small seed in a matter of two minutes; the Walsh sisters, with Miss Lamka as accompanist on the piano sang two solos. Ashley Green entertained the audience with several piano selections. Dewey McAlpine was warmly received by old neighbors, who remembered him as a high school boy at the Santa Clara school. ANNUAL REPORT OF HEALTH UNIT GIVEN

The annual report of the Lane county health unit, issued Wednesday, shows a total of 2673 medical examinations conducted by the health officer and 3800 dental examinations made under the school health service conducted by the organization.

Sixty-two teeth were filled or extracted. During the year the unit inspected 160 classes in county schools and gave individual inspections to 3501 pupils. There were 98 pre-school health field visits and 240 clinic visits.

The unit conducted 39 immunizations for diphtheria in pupils under six years of age and 417 for pupils over six years old. A total of 303 Schick tests were given and 241 tests for smallpox were given.

In the work of public health instruction, the unit sent speakers to 47 meetings with a total attendance of 807 persons. Eighty-one health classes were taught with an attendance of 594 persons.

On the first line of the card the figure "24" to the right of the abbreviation "Res" means 24 kilowatt hours of residential lighting, as indicated by the key at the bottom of the card.

The figure "7" on the second line of the card at the right of the abbreviation "wtr" means 700 cubic feet of water. The star refers to the footnote in the lower right hand corner of the card, which says that "consumption of water is in hundreds of cubic feet."

The "7" does not mean just 7 cubic feet, but as stated in the footnote, 100 x 7 cubic feet, or 700 cubic feet.

If the figure in the "consumed" column were 30 cubic feet, the total amount would be 100 x 30 cubic feet, or 3,000 cubic feet.
