## REVENUE FINANCE BILL IS COMPLETED

Construction Measure Is Ready for Approval By Congress

HOOPER GIVES O. K. Limits Placed on Loans; Dawes, Meyer Help With Revision

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21.—(AP)—The senate today adopted the conference report on the \$125,000,000 federal land bank bill, completing congressional action. The house had approved the measure earlier in the day and senate action sent it to the White House. It is the first of President Hoover's emergency economic relief proposals to get through congress.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21.—(AP)—Carefully and speedily revised by members of the senate and house, this greatest of peace-time emergency measures returned to two chambers for final approval, consummation expected tomorrow. All victims of the accident were prominent residents of Stayton vicinity and Marion county for years. Mrs. Siegmund, whose husband is a brother of County Judge Siegmund, of Marion county, is survived by four children, and Mrs. Fery also leaves four children. Giebler was never married.
