So many roses have been received at the Portland garden that more beds are to be made, he said.

HARRISBURG ROAD WORK IS PLANNED

HARRISBURG, Ore., Jan. 21.—(Special)—The owners' committee of Lane county plans to start clearing a little of the right of way of a section of the Harrisburg-Corvallis market road soon. One section of the road was built last year and another will be constructed this year. A few small changes will be made in the location of the right of way. Actual work on the section, which will be just north of the one made last year, will start this coming spring or summer.

After a few days of snow and high water, spring is promised again. So far the coldest weather of the winter was in November. No damage by freezing has been done to crops.

C. W. Murphy is preparing to plant 50 acres more hops next month, which make a total crop of this year of 400 acres. Most of it is under contract. Yesterday he sold 91 bales of the old crop. The new land is river bottom soil and the very best. A small part, eight or ten acres, has just been cleared. The hops will bear some this year and a full crop next year.

The Lions club met last night and decided to work for two changes in the town charter. One would separate the offices of street commissioner and town marshal. The other would make the marshal appointive instead of elective. The proposed change will be taken up with the council at the next meeting.

Autopsy On Culbertson-Lenz Bridge Methods Is Continued

Editor's note: This is the second of three articles on playing methods demonstrated in the Lenz-Culbertson test of contract bridge bidding systems.

NEW YORK, Jan. 21.—(AP)—What ever the recent Culbertson-Lenz contract bridge match demonstrated about methods of bidding, it did show that skillful playing of the cards is essential to any system. The expert counts on taking all the tricks possible. For that reason he often rushes in where the two would fear to tread.

With many contracts the play is simple and the bidding is the thing. With others the expert has to make use of deductions from bids, leads and the like to take essential tricks at the twelfth and thirteenth tricks of the hand.

The necessity of intimate knowledge of end plays for successful contract was proved in the great match. End plays force an opponent to lead a certain suit. Except as a last resort or unless a certain card is marked by bidding or otherwise as being in a certain hand, the expert does not guess, particularly when to do so would endanger a contract. He utilizes more certain methods.
